Father Moffenbier Honored by Sister

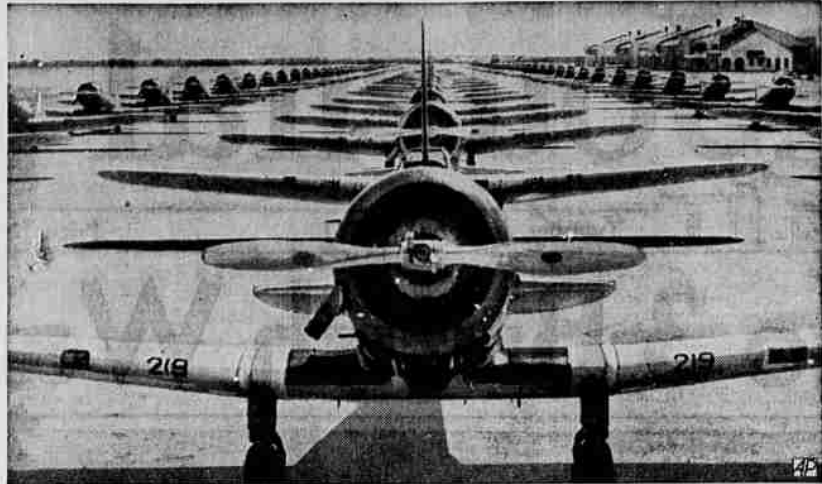

Old Highway Again in Use;

Albany—Traffic will be resumed probably this week on the old Pacific highway from Tower Grove to Main street via the old location of the Cox creek bridge, which has been renewed, it was announced by Ray Furrow, resident highway engineer.

The new structure spans Cox creek at the same location as did the old but, while it was being constructed, a dam was erected across the creek, creating a lake immediately above in the basin left by extraction of fill material from the Cox creek borrow pit.

The old road was closed last fall.

Stamp Plan Used

Albany—The food stamp plan was adopted for Linn county and the county was removed from the list of hold-out counties in connection with the federal plan. The public welfare commission, including the county court, this week-end came to the decision. The court appropriated \$5000 for use as a revolving fund with which to finance the plan. Effective date of the plan in Linn county, however, has not been established and will be determined by the state welfare commission, with which still rests the decision as to whether or not Linn county will be admitted to participation.

Defense Training Classes Probed

Monmouth—The Monmouth high school is investigating the possibility of holding industrial defense training classes. Young men between the ages of 17 and 24 who are not attending school are eligible for enrollment. The courses, which would consist of practical training in electrical work, carpentry, machine shop and auto mechanics, must have at least 10 enrollees and continue 15 or more hours per week for at least eight weeks. Skilled tradesmen of the community would serve as instructors and would be paid prevailing wages for their trade. Classes could be held wherever the facilities were available and at hours most convenient for the largest number. The program is a part of the emergency defense program for training workers and the federal government bears the expense.

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Linn Public Welfare Funds Are Boosted

Albany—Persons who are being given assistance through the Linn county public welfare commission received last year a total of \$188,567.27 in cash or equivalent in comparison with \$185,355.61 in 1939, an increase of \$3,211.66, according to John Beard, public welfare administrator.

Linn county taxpayers contributed \$46,078.46 of the total in 1940, compared with \$40,872.89 in 1939.

Mr. Beard's report showed that for general assistance, which totaled \$38,992.77, was practically the same in 1940 as in 1939 but there was an increase of \$2,435.37 in costs of medical attention, for which \$13,376.94 was expended in 1940.

The old age assistance absorbed, as usual, the greater part of the relief funds as they received \$118,621.50, distributed among an average of slightly less than 500 persons. Aid to dependent children increased from \$24,226.00 in 1939 to \$29,149.50 last year, an increase of \$5,923.50. This is the largest increase in any single item in a comparison of the two years.
