Birth Records At Lebanon Are Shattered

Lebanon—Births in this vic- inity during 1940 amounted to 286 boys and girls, setting a re- cord that beat 1939's previous all- time high of 208, by 78 births.

The records, compiled by the local registrar's office of the city health service, include Le- banon, Waterloo, Lacombe, Soda- ville and outlying rural districts.

A record number of deaths was also recorded during 1940, with 116 fatalities, four more than the previous high noted in 1938 and 13 more than in 1939.

New 1940 babies included 148 girls and 138 boys.

Albany—Albany will have a Na- tional Youth Administration proj- ect starting Tuesday of next week, it was announced Thursday by Cal Edwards of the state employment service office and R. E. McCormack, superintendent of Albany's public schools, after a conference with Chester I. Nelson, district super- visor of the NYA.

The first project will employ 24 boys in renovating the lawn and athletic fields at Central school. Superintendent McCormack stated. The gridiron turf on the Central field will be repaired and re-seeding will be done where necessary and a tile drain system will be installed. The surface of the baseball diamond will be repaired as will the lawn in front of the school.

It is hoped to start a girls' sewing project here within the near fu- ture, Edwards stated.

Pilot Training Wanted

Albany—Members of the Albany American Legion post are opposed to a reputed attempt of the U. S. army to wreck the civilian pilot training program now being con- ducted by the civil aeronautics ad- ministration, and to concentrate all pilot training in the southern United States on existing and projected ar- my flying fields.

The opposition was voiced in a resolution passed by the legion post this week after Howard Burleson, lessee of the Albany airport, re- vealed that the war department is threatening an attempt to take over the pilot training program entirely, eliminating the civilian features, on the contention that this latter program involves too much waste and is of little benefit to the national defense effort.

The post instructed its resolutions committee to draw up a protest to be submitted to the Oregon delegation in congress.
