

Lebanon Gets Vocational Class Program

Lebanon—Vocational training will be offered in the high school here in the near future for all men between the ages of 17 and 24 as an aid toward national defense, it is announced by Milton E. Coe, school superintendent.

Classes in woodworking and auto and motor mechanics in the school shops will be held during late afternoon, evenings and Saturday mornings. Hope was expressed that the program will get under way early in February.

Funds for equipment and instructors' salaries will be supplied through the Salem office of the national defense board. The courses will be open free of charge to any young man not enrolled in school, as well as to high school students in regular classwork.

Howard Hickox, school instructor, will conduct the woodworking classes. Mechanics classes will be taught by a qualified local man not yet selected.

An advisory board has been named to assist in the program, consisting of Dan Ashton and Edmond Gray, representing agriculture; Paul Middlebrook, Crown Willamette paper mill superintendent, representing employers, and Don Phelps, representing labor.

The program will be under the direct control of the Lebanon school board.

Scio Re-Rating For Insurance Crowns Efforts

Scio—Recent re-rating of Scio to class 7 in fire insurance risks is considered a happy culmination of efforts of long standing on the part of the local city council and civic organizations.

Official information of the new status was received a few days ago and property owners carrying insurance have expressed genuine satisfaction with triumph at long last.

Heretofore Scio has been considered by rating bureaus as having practically no fire protection, hence the city has been classified in the rate 10 bracket.

Signal improvements in the water system of the city during the last two years have served as a potent factor in securing a re-rating, which is said to be retroactive to May 1 last.

Just what percent of reduction in insurance rates on property here will follow reclassification has not been definitely learned, but it is confidently believed the change will be much in favor of policy-holders.

Not only reduction in fire insurance rates is expected soon to follow, but outside capital seeking investments will be more favorably inclined to investigate Scio as a potential field, in the opinion of local men who have worked on this proposition for years.
