The survey embraced the water system, the water mains, sewage disposal plant, all fire apparatus, fire hazards and a number of other angles which have a bearing on the rates. Dallas Fire Losses Pass Million Mark

Dallas—The annual report of the fire department, prepared and submitted to the city council by Walter L. Young, fire chief, indicates that the department responded to 55 alarms during 1940. The value of the property involved is estimated at \$1,306,599.22 and insurance paid to cover fire loss is set at \$425,377.45.

The big fire of the year was the one at the Willamette Valley Lumber company sawmill in October and the insurance paid the Southern Pacific company for the loss of its rolling stock, consumed by fire in the mill blaze, is not included in the figures given.

In 56 per cent of the alarms no loss was suffered and Young indicates that the purchase of new trucks and apparatus made a few months ago was fully justified particularly in the case of the mill fire where heavy demands were made upon all the fire fighting equipment available.

The fire engines worked perfectly and pumped steadily for a period of approximately eight hours.

In addition to their regular fire fighting duties the department answered 103 ambulance calls, supplied oxygen to the hospitals when called upon, erected the Christmas tree on the courthouse lawn, repaired toys and contributed in general to the holiday cheer.

Young recommends that where water mains are being replaced, they should, with few exceptions, have an increased capacity. He also urges that fire hydrants be serviced more frequently in order to eliminate any possible chance that they might fail when the emergency arose.

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Motors Choice For Study in Defense Plans

Albany—"Care and Operation of Automobiles, Trucks and Tractors" was selected Monday as the subject to be taught when the local vocational education program for defense is launched next week. It was announced by the board of school district No. 5, M. K. Buchner was named instructor.

This subject was determined as the choice after questionnaires sent to 35 prospective students indicated that 20 were interested in such work.

Ralph Morgan of the state department of education was present and explained the program.

Morgan stated that the program is designed particularly for rural youth between the ages of 17 and 24, adding that in Oregon about 100 such classes will be under way before February 1. Participants must be young men who are not in school.

Dallas—Carl Black, substitute city mail carrier, was just a little bit too impetuous when he came to work Tuesday morning for when he nosed his car into the parking space on Court street in front of Lynn's Vanity and Barber shop it packed too much slip.

The barber shop sign, the old familiar red and white revolving kind, barred the way but not for long as the bumper of the car smashed the cast iron base and brought the sign to earth. A pretty badly broken up, aside from a bent bumper and the smashed up sign there was no material damage and no one was injured.

Lebanon Losses By Fire are Light
Lebanon—Fires in this city during 1940 caused but \$631.50 in damages, a low figure beaten only in 1938 when fire damage totaled \$386. Fire department records disclosed Tuesday. Losses in 1939 amounted to \$850.

The 1940 loss occurred in property whose risk during the fires was estimated at \$200,250. Greatest damage was caused by a sawdust bin fire at the Sewell-Wynn lumber company last April 27, amounting to \$545.

Of the year's total loss, \$600 was recovered by insurance, the report showed.

New equipment added to the fire department included 600 feet of hose, one extinguisher and two sires. Two minor injuries were suffered by volunteer firemen on duty.

The department made 197 inspections and removed 15 fire hazards during the year.
