Simmons served two terms on the Woodburn city council, was a member of Woodburn lodge No. 106, A.F. & A.M., Evergreen chapter No. 41, Order of the Eastern Star, Woodburn chapter No. 29, R.A.M., St. Elmo Commandery No. 20, Knights Templar, Al Kader Temple of Portland and Railway Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way No. 1032, Portland.

He was married to Annette Vedder August 21, 1888, on the Vedder farm near Harrisburg for 10 years and came to Woodburn in 1899, living here two years when they moved to Portland but returned to Woodburn in 1905 and since made their home here.

Surviving are his widow, Annette Simmons; son, Robert W. of Tacoma; daughter, Mrs. L. M. Flagg of Salem, and two grandchildren. He also leaves a sister, Mrs. J. L. Jack of Woodburn, and a brother, Fred S. Simmons of Oregon City.

Funeral services will be held from the Ringo chapel Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock with Rev. R. E. Smith of the Methodist church officiating. Interment will be at Belle Passi cemetery under the auspices of Woodburn lodge No. 106, A.F. & A.M.
