

Tuberculosis in Oregon Said to Be Decreasing

Monmouth—That tuberculosis in the state of Oregon is on the decline was the statement made by Dr. O. C. Bellinger of the Oregon Tuberculosis hospital in his address to the annual meeting of the Polk County Health association held Wednesday evening in the Dallas city hall. The tuberculosis tests in schools also show fewer reactionary cases.

"But we must have the full cooperation of the public in order to do our best service," said Dr. Bellinger. "Problems of patients are the middle age or past with firmly fixed habits who do not take kindly to restraint. Early stages of the disease are being brought to light much sooner than previously and it is often difficult to isolate a patient in the early stages as he is not yet to the point of illness but the speaker found plenty of pleasant experiences to balance the inconveniences. Prevention is based on education and the spirit of cooperation will eventually eliminate the disease."

"Our task would be ten times lighter if the whole population could be brought to think as the health group thinks, although cooperation is more prominent now than two or three years ago," stated Dr. A. B. Starbuck, county health officer. He further said: "We have no right here unless we are of service" and looked forward to a full time health service for the county.

Miss Gillis, county health nurse, gave an informative report of work accomplished the past year. In her capacity as nurse she covered 21,000 miles. Her report also revealed the Dallas Lions club has provided 27 pair of glasses for children the past year. She stressed the need of an educational program for the public that it may better understand the service of the county health work and state institutions.

The returns from this year's sale of Christmas seals are running in advance of last year's figures. Reported Mrs. W. E. Knower, Polk county seal sale chairman. Returns are incomplete.

R. H. Chapin, chairman of the Polk county infantile paralysis campaign committee, announced his authorization to organize a county chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. The project was discussed and the tentative date of February 5, 8 p.m., set for the meeting in Dallas. Mr. Chapin announced three ways arranged by the committee to collect funds for the present campaign, namely: the placing of coin boxes in business houses; coin envelopes mailed to Polk county's 1500 telephone users and the sale of paper tabs in the schools.

A change in the fiscal year was approved, a fifteen month year adopted and the executive committee instructed to amend the constitution accordingly.

A vote of thanks was accorded the Dallas chamber of commerce for the use of the hall and the secretary-treasurer report accepted.

As the present officers desired to be released, the nominating committee headed by Mrs. Knower, announced the nomination of Dr. Starbuck for president for the coming year and the re-nominating of Dr. O. A. Fratzke for the vice-presidency. The report was unanimously accepted. The outgoing president, Rawson H. Chapin, was given a rising vote of thanks for his past year's service. Dr. Starbuck who will choose his own secretary, said he accepted his new office with a feeling of confidence.

Classes Start In First Aid At Lebanon

Lebanon—A new series of first aid classes was started here this week at the Lebanon hotel under John Siml, first aid instructor for the American Red Cross.

The first class was held Tuesday evening, and a series of lessons covering a period of 10 weeks will follow, to be conducted for two and one-half hours each Tuesday night starting at 7:30.

The classes were organized under Clarence Shlmanek, county first aid chairman, who has directed more than 50 men from local industrial and business houses through the fall and winter training period just closed.

Eleven men attended the first meeting of the new series, most of them from the Crown-Willamette paper mill, but Shlmanek stated that the course can easily accommodate 15 or 20 men.

Safety records of local industrial firms since the first aid course began five years ago have dropped proportionately, according to Shlmanek, and employers have declared the classes a "good investment," he asserted.

Only cost to the student is a text book. The course emphasizes prevention of accidents while employed, as well as treatment of injuries, the first aid leader pointed out.

In 1920 he retired from business but a cherry orchard near the city reservoir was his particular interest for a number of years past. His membership in Friendship Lodge I.O.O.F. covered a period of almost 50 years.

Surviving are one daughter, Mrs. H. B. Viars, and one grand-daughter, Miss Helen Viars. With the exception of a half brother, George Coad in California, he was the last surviving member of his family.

The body is being sent north and Mr. and Mrs. Viars will accompany it. Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

City Council Sends Letters To Delegation

Albany—Albany's city council instructed Karl Horton, city recorder, to write each member of the Linn county delegation at the state legislature in Salem requesting his support of measures sponsored by the League of Oregon Cities to procure for incorporated towns in Oregon greater degrees of participating in state automobile license fees and gas tax revenues and in liquor license fees.

The council voted after a discussion in which it was pointed out that cities and towns are entitled to a greater share of highway department revenues because their streets bear the greater portion of traffic and because residents of municipalities pay a large portion of the license and gas tax fees.

Action regarding the liquor license fees was taken on the ground that city police duties have been increased and a corresponding increase in municipal taxes has been imposed upon towns because of direct or indirect effects of state liquor control.

According to Perry A. Stellmacher, chief of police, in 1932 there were 28 arrests for drunkenness or other offenses involving liquor, and now the average is about 260 for liquor offenses, he stated.
