Walling Dies From Injury

Wheatland—Grant Walling, 75, of Wheatland died Thursday at the General hospital in McMinnville two hours after being fatally injured with a limb striking him on the head. With his son, Kirkwood Walling, and Harry Fowler, he was felling trees for fuel on his farm in the Wheatland district. A tree striking another one broke a limb off. He did not speak or regain consciousness afterward.

He was the 15th child in a family of 19 children, four boys and nine girls. Born at Zena in Polk county, April 6, 1865, the son of pioneer parents, his father, Jesse Walling was a pioneer who came to Oregon in 1847.

He was married to Miss Nellie Kirkwood at Hopewell August 28, 1887. She was the daughter of pioneer parents, John Kirkwood and Charlotte Matheny Kirkwood, the former coming to Oregon in 1848 and the latter in 1843.

He was a very efficient professional painter and paper hanger. He later devoted his time to diversified farming. He received his education at Zena and was a member of the Hopewell Seventh Day Adventist church. He served many years on the Wheatland school board.

Walling was a talented musician and was prominent in orchestral music, playing the first violin and also played the cornet and piano.

He is survived by his widow and one son and one granddaughter, Loraine Walling, all of Wheatland, and one sister, Mrs. Alice Pomroy, 78, of Kimberly, Ida. Funeral services are under direction of Macy of McMinnville and will be held at 2 o'clock Sunday at the Hopewell Seventh Day Adventist church.
