

Option Taken on Log Dump for Independence Mill

Legal Action Will Determine Final Prospect

Independence—The option on the Hill property just south of Independence, including a site for a log dump and property for a spur to run from the Valley & Siletz railroad, consisting of approximately 25 acres to the Inman-Poulson Lumber company was exercised this week.

Deeds from Homer Hill, Verde Hill and wife, Wendall Denlinger and wife, and the Hill heirs to Charles E. Dent, trustee, were filed at the office of C. L. Graves, Polk county clerk, Monday.

Immediately following the filing of these deeds the Bank of California National association filed a suit of foreclosure against the Inman-Poulson Lumber company and Charles E. Dent, trustee, asking for judgment to the sum of \$1,355,245.32 plus interest of \$12,500, and \$16,555, abstract fees of \$164.60 and attorney fees of \$40,000, and totaling \$1,424,464.92.

The option exercised on the Hill property was to provide an outlet for the Inman-Poulson timber holdings at Independence. The plan calls for a spur from the Valley & Siletz railroad to the river and the construction of a log dump south of the Mountain States Power company property. What effect the foreclosure suit will have on these plans or how much delay it might cause is not known. Arrangements might be made soon so that the timber could be moved to market or it might be held up to the end of the redemption period of one year.

Verde Hill stated that he had been informed that plans called for the dumping of 125 cars a day of logs but others estimate that 40 to 50 cars a day would be a more nearly correct estimate. It is estimated that it will take from seven to 10 years to exhaust the supply of logs from the present holdings of Inman-Poulson.

The purchase price of the land purchased from the Hills was made public but from figures given on the foreclosure proceedings it is estimated at approximately \$13,000. This is no doubt one of the largest transactions for some time here and when actual operations of dumping logs get under way it is expected to be noticed in Independence. It will necessitate a maintenance crew, an extra railroad crew and two boats operating from here.

Silverton Voters Advised of Facts

Silverton—A few facts given out by H. W. Adams, superintendent of the local schools, are of interest to the voter of the district in the Monday, February 10, election which has to do with financing the new agricultural building for the Smith-Hughes class work and shop experiments.

The maximum possible cost to the district for the \$7,200 building is \$2,000. This amount will make no material difference in the present tax rate to the property owner but the vote is necessary to secure the approval of the people. The project is being made possible through government defense funds of the National Youth administration already apportioned to Oregon, in a project to teach the rural youth something practical in agricultural pursuits and mechanics as applied to tractors, trucks, or other farm machinery, in fact, carrying on the general

work of former years with an expanded program.

Only six schools in the state have been selected for this privilege with Silverton mentioned first on the list as having the greatest need for the building.

The building will be placed near the senior high school with the rear of the shop facing the north road to the school grounds permitting the entrance of farm machinery or trucks to the shop for repair work. The class room faces the south or front entrance of the building. Heat, water and sewage will be included in the plant that operates for the present senior high building and grounds. Windows, equipment and other materials are being supplied from the present shop at the old high school building which is now inadequate in size and location for the present needs of the agricultural program.

This will be a warrant election and will be held in the old senior high school from 2 until 7 p. m. Monday, February 10. Any property owner, or owner of stocks or shares or having a co-partnership with a tax-paying firm, may vote at the school election. A large turnout for voting is urged by the board of directors who have given their approval of the plan for the construction of the building.
