

Sawmill Construction Started at Lebanon This Week

Log Cores Used For Operation; Boost Sought

Lebanon—Construction of a new sawmill began here Thursday morning to convert lumber out of cores remaining from peeler logs of the Evans Products company's Lebanon plywood plant.

The mill is being erected by two Lebanon men, Aaron Ingram and Charles Smith, at a cost of between \$2000 and \$2500. Electrically equipped, the mill will have a capacity production of approximately 300,000 feet of two-by-four lumber a month.

Equipment for the mill arrived Thursday morning from Seattle, consisting of an American sawmill and a three-saw planer. The mill will be in operation in about 10 days, the partners say.

The lumber will be sold, rough, to local lumber companies who in turn will plane the material and handle sales of the finished product.

The mill site is on property leased this week from the city, between Third and Fourth streets on Oak west of the railroad tracks.

Companies Shut Down

Lebanon—A deadlock over contract rates for log-hauling brought a shutdown in the Scott-Gilbert and the Jack Swanson Logging companies here when 19 truck drivers of the lumber and sawmill workers union (CIO) cooperated with truck owners in refusing to haul logs until higher rate demands are met.

Walter Scott and Swanson of the two logging concerns asserted they could not meet the eight per cent increase asked earlier this week by a committee of drivers, truck operators and CIO organizers for the LSWU.

As a result, truckers Wednesday refused to haul company logs from the woods near Berlin, to destinations at Lebanon, Albany and Sweet Home, while 60 loggers employed by Scott-Gilbert and Swanson were forced out of work by the shutdown.

Both factions declared that the dispute did not involve wages, and was not a labor spat. No break was seen in the deadlock Thursday truckers claiming they could not operate at a profit at the present scale, while Scott and Swanson said conditions would not allow them to pay higher rates at this time.

Independence Council Gets Power Request

Independence—A letter from the mayor and city council of Monmouth asking for a 20-year franchise to furnish power for the street lights of Independence was read and referred to the street and light committee, at a meeting of the city council of Independence Wednesday evening.

Councilman M. N. Nelson reported that 100 yards of gravel had been placed on the streets of the city and that the county grader had gone over the streets and most of the alleys; parking markers and crossing lanes had been repainted, tile replaced on Seventh street and poison oak removed near the foot bridge on Monmouth street.

Dr. George Herley reported a request from the P-T.A. for markers for school crossings and the city recorder was instructed to write the League of Oregon Cities for information.

Councilman C. E. Calbreath reported that the police bell was not working properly. Fire Chief George Wood reported that the city hydrants were being repainted and requested the purchase of a new nozzle for the fire hose.

Councilman W. A. Barnum reported the city finances in good shape and his request to transfer amounts from the emergency fund to cover small shortages in other funds in the 1940 budget was granted.

The council Calbreath stated that the report for better street lighting was not ready. Dr. Herley reported that a meeting had taken place with the power company officials and their cooperation was assured.

Councilman H. M. Amshery reported that he and John Black, city recorder had gone over the some 500 city ordinances and gave each a title. He stated that there were only about 25 of these now in force, the others having mostly been repealed or made ineffective by new ordinances.

Mayor M. J. Butler appointed Ira Mix as city treasurer and the appointment was confirmed by the council.

A contract with John Cunningham for engineering services for the city sewer improvement project was approved and the city attorney was ordered to prepare an ordinance for the purchase of necessary materials.

On the motion of Councilman Nelson a new wash basin was ordered for the city hall apartment.
