

New Lebanon Building Hits High Figure

Lebanon—Building construction during the first five weeks of the new year in this city began in high gear, when 20 permits were issued for new business buildings, apartments, a sawmill, residences and repairs, amounting to a total estimated cost of \$43,670.

Building estimates for the same five weeks last year were set at \$24,150.

Largest single permit was issued in January for the new Ray Downing business building at Main and Ash, now well underway, costing \$12,000.

Started soon after were the C. A. Upham motel apartments at Vine and Grove, estimated to cost \$5,000, and this week Ray Scroggin started construction of his recreation building and bowling alley on East Grant, costing \$8,500.

Construction of the new \$250 Ingram and Smith sawmill at Third and Oak, to convert Douglas fir plywood cores into lumber, was started Thursday of this week.

Permits for four new houses in January and one for the first week in February were issued, for an estimated total of \$11,900. Remainder of the permits was for remodeling, repairs and excavation.

Courses Prove Popular
Lebanon—The new defense training courses at Lebanon high school attracted so many young men this week that 28 out of 58 who applied were forced to wait until more funds are allotted for additional classes. The 30 now taking afternoon and evening classes in auto and tractor mechanics and woodworking were drawn by lot. Most of them preferred the mechanical courses, and if more funds are granted the school, classes in sheet metal and welding will be added.

Appreciation for the equipment loaned by local auto and tractor dealers was expressed by Supt. Milton E. Coe, the school board and the defense advisory board.
