

Seek to Avert Railroad Strike in Vermont

(By the Associated Press)

A way to avert a strike on the Rutland railroad in Vermont was sought by the national mediation board today following an urgent appeal by William H. Willis, Vermont governor.

The line is the link between Montreal and Boston, and Willis termed the prospective strike "important nationally and internationally at this time."

Fifteen railroad brotherhoods representing 1,300 employees voted to strike at 5 p. m. tomorrow "to resist a wage reduction from 10 to 30 percent," railway labor officials said.

The line is in receivership, and some Vermonters expressed fear that if a strike began the road might cease operations permanently.

Negotiations in the strike of CIO employees of the Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing company, Milwaukee, were renewed today in Washington after union and company delegations held separate discussions last night. The strike, in its 23rd day, is holding up production on \$45,000,000 in defense orders.

Other labor developments included:

Akron, Ohio—A federal conciliator attempted to mediate a labor dispute at the Seiberling Rubber company, which has defense orders for tires and anti-gas equipment. Union workers authorized a strike—not as yet approved by the CIO—United Rubber Workers' union international board—after the company rejected demands for wage increases.

Youngstown, Ohio—A wage dispute brought on a walkout yesterday of 150 employees of the Youngstown Metal Products company, which makes parts for manufacturers working on defense orders.

Hancock, Mich.—A strike affecting 851 employees of the Quincy Mining company shut down production at a copper works yesterday. Wage increases and the question of a union shop were at issue.

Selective Service Report Made

State selective service headquarters said today that 30,379 of Oregon's 134,613 registrants have been classified, and that 20 per cent have been retained as available for full military service.

Another 3.7 per cent were certified for limited service, such as bookkeeping and other clerical jobs. The number deferred because of having dependents was 82.7 per cent, while only 1.8 per cent were deferred because their jobs are vital to national defense. About 6.3 per cent were deferred for physical disabilities or criminal records.

Local boards have been directed to stop sending questionnaires as soon as they have enough men qualified to fill their quotas, plus 15 per cent to cover physical rejections.

Questionnaires will not be sent to all registrants immediately because their classifications may change before being called up for service. This would compel the boards to reclassify such men.

Party Shapes Its Ideals by Lincoln Plan

The republican party must become the constitutional party of the nation. Like Lincoln, it must put principle ahead of everything else, preserve itself, and in that process save the nation, Niel R. Allen of Grants Pass said at the Lincoln day banquet of Marion county republicans last night.

In his fight to save the union every act of Lincoln was based on constitutional ground, without mere preaching about preservation of the constitution, he said.

Mr. Allen saw a new crisis in the lend-lease bill after an eight-year fight for preservation of constitutional rights. In presenting a united front to the world partisanship must be forgotten, he said, but republicans must fight for restoration of constitutional rights after the present emergency has passed.

Sharp differences of opinion on the mechanics of American aid to Britain arose in the speeches of Wendell L. Willkie and other republican orators at Lincoln day banquets over the

national last night. Willkie's appeal for prompt American assistance for the embattled British did not set the keynote for all other speakers. Some of them had sharp criticism for terms of the pending lend-lease bill, which Willkie previously had endorsed with modifications.

The 1940 presidential nominee called on republicans to seize "a golden opportunity" and take the lead in furnishing American equipment to "the fighting men of Britain."

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Red Cross Hears Appeal from A. L. Schafer

San Francisco, Feb. 13—An appeal to Red Cross workers to meet the nation's greatest demand for social service since World War days has been issued by A. L. Schafer, manager of the Pacific Area, American Red Cross.

Schafer announced that a series of institutes or seminars to explain war service demands will be held throughout the Pacific district, the first scheduled for Tacoma February 13-14, and the second in Portland, Oregon, February 17-21.

The Tacoma institute will be attended by Red Cross workers and executives in the Puget Sound area, while the Portland sessions will bring workers from all over Oregon.

"Perhaps most people do not realize," said Schafer, "how severe is the impact of change in the lives of thousands of young men who are leaving home for the first time to become part of the American defense program. Often this shock extends also to the family the trainee leaves behind—perhaps illness occurs in the family, or perhaps the wage-earner is thrown out of work."

"It is in such cases that the American Red Cross must step into the breach—to act as liaison agent between the army authorities and the family back home, to give advice and relief where necessary."

This branch of Red Cross activity, Schafer explained, is known as Home Service and is mandatory upon the organization under terms of its congressional charter given in 1905. During World War I the Red Cross rendered counsel and service in thousands of homes disrupted by military demands, but in the peaceful years that followed only a skeleton set-up was necessary.

In the Tacoma and Portland institutes Red Cross specialists in various phases of war and home service will conduct classes for Red Cross volunteers.
