Flag Salute Failure Gets Full Approval

Silverton—With a question answered in the affirmative concerning the approval of the speaker as to his opinion of the refusal of certain religionists to salute the flag of the United States, some of the glamor of the highly orated talk by two members of the University of Oregon department of public speaking, lost its glow for a number of guests at the Silverton Chamber of Commerce dinner hour Wednesday night, who have an old-fashioned respect for the flag and are not considering giving up this idea.

Rendel Burdette Aldredge, majoring in economics at the state university, followed Carl Pectz of the pre-law department of the university, on the topic, "Concept of Liberty and Freedom." Aldredge mentioned the "Witnesses of Jehovah" as being unjustly treated and was asked if he approved of their refusing to salute the flag, answering that he did. Pectz was introduced by Kenneth Erickson of the social science department, and talked on the revolutionary tendency of change for the Constitution of the United States. The series of talks was explained by Erickson as the personal opinions of the young men program guests and "not to doings of the university." He listed the talks under the general head of "The American Way."

S. Parry Rose, president of the forum, introduced the guest speakers.

During the business hour Reber Allen and I. B. Alfred were elected as additional directors of the Chamber of Commerce.
