

Bethel Farmer Union Likes New Broadcast

Bethel—Of considerable interest to farmers and stockmen is the new radio broadcast over KEX, Monday through Friday at 1:15 p.m. This comes direct from the Portland Union stockyards, giving complete market reports and talks on raising and marketing livestock.

This was brought out in the report of Warren Creech, livestock committee chairman, at the meeting of the Bethel local of the Farmers Union. Creech reported on the growth of the Farmers Union Livestock Commission company of Portland and stated that during the past six months it has gained 100 new ship-pers each month.

Linn Clubbers Gain in Numbers
Albany — Linn county at-tained 135 4-H clubs with a total membership of 1331 af-ter 27 clubs with 210 mem-bers were organized during February. It was announced by O. E. Mikesell, county club agent.

The club agent is urging that clubs organize at an early date so that the necessary records may be complete at the end of the club year. Clos-ing dates for enrollment in the Bank of Albany corn-growing contest and the Mur-phy Seed store garden grow-ing contests are April 1.

Mattress Making Offered in Polk

Dallas—A new experience for most people in Polk county will be that of making mattresses, according to present plans developed by the Agricultural Conservation association committee at its last meet-ing with officials in charge of this work for the state of Oregon.

It is estimated that a whole car-load of baled cotton will be used in Polk county in this connection. This would supply cotton enough for about 500 mattresses, according to information received from W. C. Leth, Polk county agent, who will be in direct charge of the program for the county.

For those who have not already heard of the program, materials for making mattresses are supplied any rural family whose net income is less than \$500 for the past year. No charge is made for the mat-tresses except for a small charge made for the cost of small items of equipment and incidental ex-penses.

This program is expected to start in the next month and before any cotton can be ordered, it is neces-sary to have the applications on hand from all those wishing to be included in the program. Applica-tions are available on request at the county agent's office and they will probably also be made available at different sections over the county.

Various county and community organizations are sponsoring this program in at least five communi-ties over the county. These organi-zations will supply the buildings where the mattresses will be made and will also supply six members who will have charge of the pro-gram for the community.

The program provides that fam-ilies desiring mattresses make them themselves with the assistance of competent instructors and leaders. It is stated that a family can make one mattress in one day's time if properly instructed and if suit-able equipment is available. These mattresses contain about 50 pounds of cotton and when properly made are equal to some of the finest mat-tresses available.

It is estimated that about \$8 to \$10 worth of materials are supplied in connection with the manufacture of such a mattress. The total cost to any one who makes them will be approximately \$1 which takes care of incidental expenses as in-dicated above.

It is necessary to have sufficient applications before the cotton can be ordered as it is necessary to order the cotton in carload quanti-ties only. The bales of cotton weigh approximately 400 to 500 lbs. and these bales will be distributed to the various communities from the county center. The Polk county court has agreed to furnish the transportation and storage facili-ties for the cotton after it is re-ceived and also to transport it to the community centers.

Families to be eligible must live in a rural community and this is defined as any community or town with less than 2500 population. The mattresses are not limited to farm people only, but to any who live in such communities even though they do not live or work on farms.

It is reported that in other sec-tions of the United States, particu-larly in the south, this program has resulted in increased mattress sales by furniture establishments and has not interfered with their business.

Anyone desiring an application should send a postcard or telephone the county agent's office at Dallas and applications will be sent out on such requests immediately. Fur-ther publicity will be given in the near future when it is definitely determined where the mattress making centers will be located and what groups will be in charge of them so that applications can also be received there.

Money Function Misunderstood, Lindgren Says

Albany — Mistaken estimates of the value and function of money by the American people have been the cause of no end of trouble, J. J. Lindgren, Clackamas county agent, told 250 Linn county farmers and business men after the annual Far-mer-Merchant banquet sponsored by the Linn county Agricultural Con-servation association at the River-side community hall.

The speaker illustrated his point with the assertion that while farm prices might be on a plane higher than average, if manufactured arti-cles are on a still higher comparative plane the farmer cannot be prosperous, for he would receive less for the things he sells than he must pay for the things he buys.

Lindgren explained why it became necessary for the government to as-sist the farmer through several ag-ricultural adjustment administra-tion policies just as it had been doing on behalf of the manufacturing industries many years by means of tariffs, which he declared are the equivalent of subsidies. He stated the triple A program is an attempt to aid the farmer by giving him parity of exchange.
