

Albany Pastor Resigns Post; Now in Army

Albany—Dr. D. J. Ferguson, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Albany who has been on a leave of absence for the past several months, has tendered his resignation to the local session. Dr. Ferguson, who came here from Astoria two years ago, has been serving as chaplain in the army with headquarters at Vancouver, Wash.

Dr. Ferguson stated that in view of the fact that he was in the army and did not know when he would be released or where he would be stationed, he thought it best to resign. His resignation is to take effect March 31, 1941.

Dr. D. V. Poling of Corvallis, a former pastor of the local church, has been preaching here since Dr. Ferguson has been away.

Independence Council Acts Upon Business

Independence—The city council of Independence at its regular monthly meeting voted to purchase a uniform for William Noble, chief of police; voted to condemn the present city garbage dump and find a new place farther from the city to use for that purpose; authorized the purchase of a new city ordinance; voted to have all ordinances referred to the ordinance committee before being presented to the council and discussed the installation of improved lighting in the residential and business districts.

Councilman M. M. Nelson, chairman of the street and sewer committee, reported additional gravel placed on streets and alleys, the repair of the foot bridge on Monmouth street, the painting of the fire hydrants and the checking with John J. Dann, Polk county WPA superintendent on the sewer work, which is to start here March 17.

M. M. Fulmer, chairman of the police committee, moved that the city purchase a uniform for William Noble, chief of police, with the provision that hereafter the police be required to furnish and maintain their own uniforms. This motion was seconded by Councilman H. M. Amsherry. Councilman C. E. Calbreath stated that he favored continuing to furnish and maintain the uniforms if they purchased the one for Chief Noble; Councilman W. A. Barnum stated that he did not object to the purchase of the uniform but the police budget had been increasing each year and he was afraid of criticism for the increased expense of the police department.

W. A. Barnum, chairman of the finance committee, reported \$5,889.80 cash on hand as of February 28, of all city funds.

Business Men Invite Farmers Forum Meeting

Silverton—The Farmers-Business Men's night of the Chamber of Commerce program was attended Wednesday night by around 50 farmers and their wives and a number of business men in the second of a series of educational meetings as a feature of the year's forum program planned by the president, S. Parzy Rose, Arthur King, Oregon State college extension specialist in soils, was the featured speaker and refreshments were served after the program by R. B. Duncan, Earl R. Adams and Ralph Larson.

King gave facts and figures on the benefits of irrigation for individual ranchers, explaining legal rights of Oregon stream diversions, use of wells for flood and sprinkler systems and of the increase of quality and production for forage and cover crops, orchards, vegetables, grains and berries.

King explained that irrigation could make room in the Willamette valley for 4,000 more ranchers who could do a profitable business with farms of 40 to 50 acres, where now, with Clackamas county farms as an example, the rancher of thirty or less acres with dry farming is not considered doing a too profitable business.

His talk was practical and instructive.

Making the trip from Salem with King was Robert Rieder, acting Marion county agent.

Glenn Price, chairman of the Farmers-Business Men's meetings, was master of ceremonies. Price announced that another farmers' program would be given in two months.

Blind Man Makes Fine Wooden Chest

Lincoln—Mr. and Mrs. Charles Turnbow have as their guest from Tigard, his father, William Turnbow, who plans to be here two weeks.

Turnbow, 77, is blind. He constructed a wooden chest for his granddaughter, Vesta Mae, and brought it to her. Although he never had training the chest is an example of art with hearts and figures of free hand carving which would do credit to an accomplished artist. Mr. Turnbow, whose father came across the plains in the early pioneer days, tells some interesting history of Salem and Portland during the flood of 1899 here and in Portland when the Columbia river backed up and overflowed, covering a great portion of Portland which was then a struggling small town and travelers had to cross the Willamette on a ferry boat.
