Teacher Salary Law Favored; Programs Given

Silverton—Mrs. C. W. Walls, state president of the Parent-Teacher association, guest speaker of the local association Thursday night in the little auditorium of the senior high school, told of the various objectives of the state and national associations. She stressed the fact that the PTA was political and not partisan, that it was a lay body, cooperating with professional men and women, and mentioned HB 420 as one to be favored in its equalization of educational advantages for children throughout the state.

At the suggestion of Harry Cameron, principal of the Eugene Field grades, and the advice of Mrs. Walls, the local PTA went on record as favoring HB 503, which has to do with the new basic salary law for teachers, raising the minimum from \$701 per annum to \$1020.

Mrs. Walls dubbed the women members of the PTA as "snooping sisters," whose four-point program desires are legislative, juvenile protection, health measures, including mental and social hygiene, and citizenship, with Howard Funk, writer, national vice president, excellent authority for parental education which should be done in group divisions in grades, junior and senior high departments.

Superintendent of Schools H. W. Adams presided. Miss Harriet Smith, with Mrs. Howard Morrison at the piano, presented junior high girls in choral and skit musical stunts. Miss Seville Riley directed the senior high choral group of girls through a brief concert, assisted at the piano by Lois Legard and violin obligato by Dick Adams.

Course Opens For Training Of Young Men

Lebanon—A three-months' course in aircraft sheet metal and related drawing will start here Monday at 4 o'clock to train 20 young men to fit into west coast airplane industries.

This announcement was released this week by Lebanon School Superintendent Milton E. Coe, after approval of the new defense training course was given by the state department of vocational education.

The related drawing course will be conducted at Lebanon high school, and the sheet metal classes in Henry Den Herder's plumbing and heating shop, located on Second and Sherman. Classes will run six hours a night, five nights a week, with two hours of drawing and four of sheet metal.

Student applications from virtually every city in Lin county have been received at the Lebanon office of the state employment service, where selections are made and W. H. Baillie, office manager, announced Thursday that more than enough applications have been received to fill the first three months' quota.

The new vocational training center here ties in with similar courses being set up or enlarged in other cities in Oregon to train approximately 1500 men between the ages of 18 and 25 in aircraft industries.

Supt. Coe said that orders have been placed with the state department of vocational education for special tools to equip the Den Herder shop for training.

The shop is expected to be set up to coincide with practices being followed in airplane factories. It was explained here by a representative from the vocational education department, so that graduates will quickly fit into the operation scheme of those industries when employed.

Officials close to the vocational training program in this city expressed the belief that a second course to follow the present three-months' setup will be established if sufficient qualified men are available at that time.
