

Soil Conservation Program Offered Polk Farmers

First Meeting Slated Monday Butler Church

Dallas — The 1600 or more farmers operating some 1800 farms in Polk county will be very busy making their 1941 plans in connection with the soil conservation program in this county as well as in many others.

The county committee of which R. D. Pence, Rickreall is chairman holds a series of meetings in the various districts over the county to assist these farmers in developing their planting and farming plans so that they may earn the complete soil conservation allowance on their respective farms.

Because it is necessary that each one completely understand the program and the application of it to his farm, it is necessary that every farmer planning to participate in the program, to fill out and sign a farm plan and estimate sheet. This year, according to W. C. Leth, Polk county agent and secretary of the Polk county agricultural conservation association, a few farmers did not receive a soil conservation payment because they failed to have a farm plan and estimate sheet signed last spring.

In effect, the filling out of this form is indirectly the notification that a person wishes to participate in the program and the money is then set aside for this particular farm. Without preparing such a form, no money is planned for him and, therefore, he loses out on a payment.

Leth points out that since this plan has been followed, there has been very little misunderstanding on the part of cooperators concerning the nature and provisions of the program and as a result, a large percentage of those participating in the program have earned 10 percent of their agricultural conservation allowances.

Many growers have expressed their appreciation for receiving this help in preparing their sheets in each spring as it not only has earned them larger soil conservation payments but it has assisted them in following a better soil building program. In filling out these forms, assistance is given in the matter of grain varieties to plant and in suggested planting practices for those interested particularly in increasing their pasture or grass for seed production plantings.

The dates as tentatively set up for each community and by the community committee, which has the active supervision of its own district, follows. In each case, the community committeemen who will assist with the meetings are listed with the districts so that everyone might know the newly elected committeemen and who will be in charge. It is likely that one member of the county committee will be present at each district sign-up meeting.

The plan followed will be that of holding in general, all-day meetings and permitting operators to come at any convenient time of the day for sign-ups rather than to call a meeting for the entire district and make it necessary for many to wait their turn in being signed up. In general, the best plan to follow is for as many as possible to come as early as possible so that usually makes less waiting and saves a big rush at the end of the day and consequently further delay.
