

Nervous Vikings Drop Columbia Prep, Score 41-32

An "air dribble" finally broke up the Eugene Axemen's little game of keep away as they attempted to draw their Corvallis opponents from their positions under the basket. The Lane county champs gained a slight lead and thus were in a position to slow up proceedings as they passed the ball "around the horn."

By actual count the Axemen made 58 passes in succession without making a single attempt to score. Eventually one of them backed up near the center mark and stood still but finally tossed the ball up in the air a bit. At this juncture Chapple King turned the sphere over to Corvallis, claiming the Axemen had relinquished their right by "air dribbling."

One of the laughs of the tournament which the fans were not "in" on was provided by Coach French of the Klamath Falls Pelicans. French came to Salem wearing his long legged woolies and broke into a profuse sweat while his Pelicans were battling the huge Indians from Roseburg. "It was pretty nippy when we left Klamath," he claimed.

Sam Crowell, with three years of experience with the North Bend Bulldogs, established himself as a tournament favorite regardless of what happens from here on out with his performance against Parkrose. There was no fakery about Crowell's new all-time individual scoring record of 31 points—he made it honestly. His mates made no attempt to "feed" him and he played team work all of the way. Ted Sarpoli, who held the record up to yesterday with his 27 against Myrtle Point in 1936, checked in 13 field goals as against 12 for Sam. Nevertheless, Crowell made good on seven out of eight foul shots.

The illness of Bob Irish, biggest man on the Salem Viking club, proved a tough break for little Joe Bowersox. Joe was all set to make his first tournament debut, but with Irish out of the game temporarily, at least, Coach Harold Hank felt he needed a bit more height, so he swapped "horses" in the middle of the stream and selected Les Pearmine. Joe took it with a smile. He has another year, but this is Pearmine's last chance to make a hero out of himself.

While Columbia Prep bowed out of the championship fight before the attack of the Salem Vikings, the Portlanders provided the spectators with a bit of entertainment. The Catholic rosters brought with them a jitterbug cheer leader whose repertoire of gyrations provided a novel bit of relaxation. "Bud" O'Toole, hotshot of the Columbia Preps squad, caused the Vikings quite a bit of trouble, but he had one of the best guards in the show on him in the person of hairy-legged Bud Coons. O'Toole fooled Coons completely—once—after that Bud was ready for everything the Irishman had in the way of trick performances.

The opening day's games ran away behind schedule and the fans who stayed for the fifth contest of the afternoon met those coming on the evening for the first time. It was no fault of the management, however, that the program wasn't run off as per schedule. Too many times out on the part of the contestants caused the delay. In almost every game both sides took full advantage of the five chances to rest a bit.

Although beaten, the Silver Foxes of Silverton provided some of the best "unconscious" shooting of the first day's firing. They "hit" from almost any angle and it was a real blow when they lost Day with an injury, and Burr and Anderson through too much contact.

Salem Winner Despite Loss Of Bob Irish

The Salem Vikings were a decidedly nervous outfit of courtiers Wednesday afternoon when they and Columbia Prep of Portland opened the 22nd annual state high school basketball tournament. They were playing without the services of Big Bob Irish, who, wan and pale as the result of a severe cold, was in uniform, but watched proceedings from the bench. But as it turned out they didn't need him, for red-headed Don Cutler, making his first tournament appearance, played a good game throughout. The final score was 41 to 32 with the Irishmen pressing all of the way, although other than a brief period at the outset the Vikings led all of the way.

Paul O'Toole, famed Prep center, lived up to advance notices and canned 15 points despite some mighty efficient checking by Don Coons, who along with Eddie Salstrom fouled out in the third period.

With Salstrom, Coons, Cutler and Simmons taking turns at the basket, the Vikings pulled ahead 12 to 3 after seven minutes of play but baskets by O'Toole and Morrison cut it down to 12-7 at the quarter.

The pace slowed down perceptibly in the third period with Salstrom, Bower and Cutler each dropping in a two-pointer, while O'Toole's gift-er and Lala's basket on an out of bounds play constituted Columbia's contribution.

With Salem entering the second half leading 18 to 10, they managed to do just a mite better than hold their own during the third period which ended 29 to 20 for the Viks.

The two clubs matched baskets during the final quarter with O'Toole caging three for his side. Salem drew McMinnville for a 3 o'clock appointment this afternoon.
