Albany Wants Old Highway Through City

Albany—Reconsideration of the state highway commission's recent decision to abandon the old Pacific highway within the city limits of Albany will be asked by the city of Albany.

The city council Wednesday instructed City Attorney Victor Olliver to communicate with the commission recommending that the matter be revived for further consideration on the ground that in its present condition the old highway is not acceptable to the city.

Several thousands of dollars will be required to repair the streets heretofore maintained by the highway department, it was stated, and that it would be unfair to the city of Albany to abandon the pavement by the highway commission until it is restored to a condition of repair.

The council also instructed the attorney to ask the commission what the department intends to do about maintaining streets traversed by log haulers and the suggestion was made that it may be necessary for the city to impose load limits to protect paving on streets not maintained by the highway department.

Several miles of pavement are involved in the street return.

Livestock Larceny Charged

Albany—Arthur G. Bilyeu, 18, and Charles Brambora, 19, both of Portland, and Allen D. Overholser, Waterloo, were bound over to the circuit court grand jury under \$500 bond each on charges of larceny of livestock growing out of their alleged shooting of a calf belonging to James Robertson of Waterloo.

The trio was arrested by county and state officers Thursday. Overholser was only last Monday paroled by Judge L. H. McMahon in circuit court after having pleaded guilty to a forgery charge. Brambora is reputed a deserter from the U. S. army. All three failed to furnish bail, so all were confined to the Linn county jail.

Historical Volumes Displayed at Abbey

Mt. Angel—Almost 5,000 volumes are now arranged in the ancient book museum of the St. Benedict's Abbey base to meet the needs of practical use and public curiosity.

The museum contains printed and hand-made ancient books dating upwards from the 1400's. Part of the display is composed of books bought from the antiquariat, Kreutzer, at Aachen, Germany, in 1922.

Four books which are especially precious because they were printed between 1450 and 1500 were preserved from the library in the fire of 1926. Besides these volumes printed in the 1400's, the library numbers 151 assorted works of the 1500's; 717 of the 1600's, and a total of 3,202 books from the 1700's.

Between tattered pigskin, wood, leather and parchment covers is contained the knowledge it takes to make sections of the Greek and Latin church fathers, church history, ancient missals, Latin poetry, ancient English books, moral and dogmatic theology, lexicons and encyclopedias. Most of the volumes are written in Latin, German and French.

The Canon Law section rates the highest in completeness. The Bible section contains the word of God printed in whole or in part in 25 different languages.

Though various hand-printed books appear on the museum shelves, none of them antedates the invention of printing which occurred in 1450. One hand-printed book on display is the work of the late Brother Anselm Weissenborn, O. S. B., of the Abbey who died in 1937.

Many of the volumes in the museum were once the property of European abbeys which were suppressed during the French Revolution. This fact is evident from the names of the various monks that still appear written in the books.

Facsimiles of writing from the earliest ages also deck the museum shelves. A reprint of the Gutenberg Bible, the first book ever printed, is on hand. The entire collection enables students and visitors to get first hand information of the evolution of printing and writing through the ages.

Rural families with a net income of \$500 or less for a family of two; \$600 or less for a family of four, or \$700 or less for a family of six are subject to the plan and can engage in mattress making.

Present plans call for the establishment of five mattress making centers in order to help out on the transportation problem. Complete instructions and all materials are supplied and the time required to make a complete mattress is one day. Total cost to the individual amounts to approximately \$1 for the incidental expense of needles, string, sewing machines. Fifty pounds of cotton are allowed for each mattress and the finished product is sold to be the equivalent in quality of many of the better mattresses sold in the retail stores.

The cotton is supplied by the government and is from a surplus purchased from southern growers.

Tick Project Is Sponsored By Grangers

Silverton Hills—The Silverton Hills grange is sponsoring a "mattress commodity project," or rather attempting to do so, providing the requirements may be met for the establishing of the equipment necessary for the making of the mattresses. The committee has been contacting residents of the community for the past two weeks in an effort to have the number of 75 applicants signed up by next Monday.

The project is made possible through the Marion county agent's office. Further information may be received by contacting the executive committee, Alfred Lee, Maurice Benson, George Benson; or the home economics committee, Mrs. L. O. Hadley, Mrs. E. A. Beugli or Mrs. Victor Howard.

All materials are furnished free to the applicants. There are three groups eligible for one, two or the limit of three mattresses. Cotton and coverings, thread and needles are supplied with the project. The first group includes those whose net farm annual income is \$500 or less each year with \$50 allowed for each child; the second, a 50-50 farm and away-from-the-farm work proposition; and the third, non-farm, less than \$500 annually.

Blankets will be supplied on application to any member of the two committees.
