

Sewer Request Rejected by City Council

Silverton — The Silverton city council answered the Cannery Building Company, Inc., in the negative at last night's meeting when requested to build a sewer from the present site of the plant near the Southern Pacific depot, giving as their reasons the added responsibility of repairing and rebuilding bridges across Silver creek.

Guests from the third street section included Lloyd Moser, S. M. McClung, Olaf Bolme, A. DeGuire and Edwin Hamre. Mayor Reber Allen, Elgin McClary and the council complied with the suggestion of Moser, spokesman for the group, and voted favorably on referring the question to the Portland authorities for WPA assistance, which was explained as the next necessary step for continuing the improvements of Third street.

D. Arthur Loe of Salem was a guest of the council last night and volunteered helpful suggestions concerning bridge questions that are bothering the officials and the lay citizens of town. Loe will meet with the city manager and the street committee early this week and formulate either a temporary plan of something definite in getting the collapsed James avenue bridge ready for safe traffic while repairs are being made on the down-town Main street bridge. Lengthy discussions cited every possibility of material, temporary or permanent repairs, costs and treatment.

The claim of Ad Tokstad and others, \$87.50, was allowed in a compromise settlement for a fire that started from the city dump ground last summer and destroyed agricultural property.

Three ordinances were passed. No. 304 allowed a more elastic rule for automobile down-town parking providing the council approved. City property, posted, must not be trespassed was the portent of No. 302. The pinball ordinance aimed disfavor at the distributors favoring private owners.

Albany — Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction, in an address before the Albany Realty Board showed his listeners how the school taxes are unfair to many.

The speaker discussed the theory set forth in the state constitution whereby the state is to originate and maintain a uniform system of elementary education in the state which, under the present system, he said, is inadequately supported.

Last year 205,929 students were in the elementary and high schools of the 264,743 of school age in the state, Superintendent Putnam said. The schools maintained were in 2,015 school districts of which 1,708 were elementary schools of more than one room and 923 one room schools in the state.

Reprints Attract Stayton People
