

Good Friday Services at First Baptist

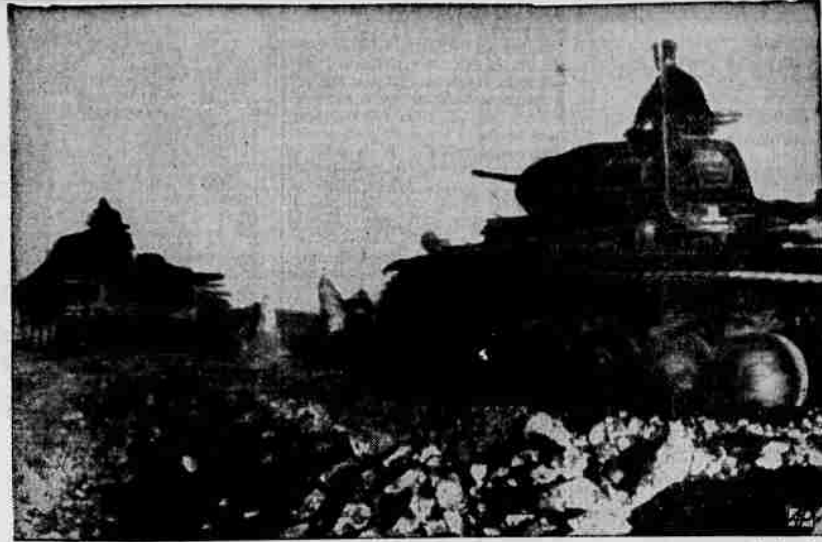

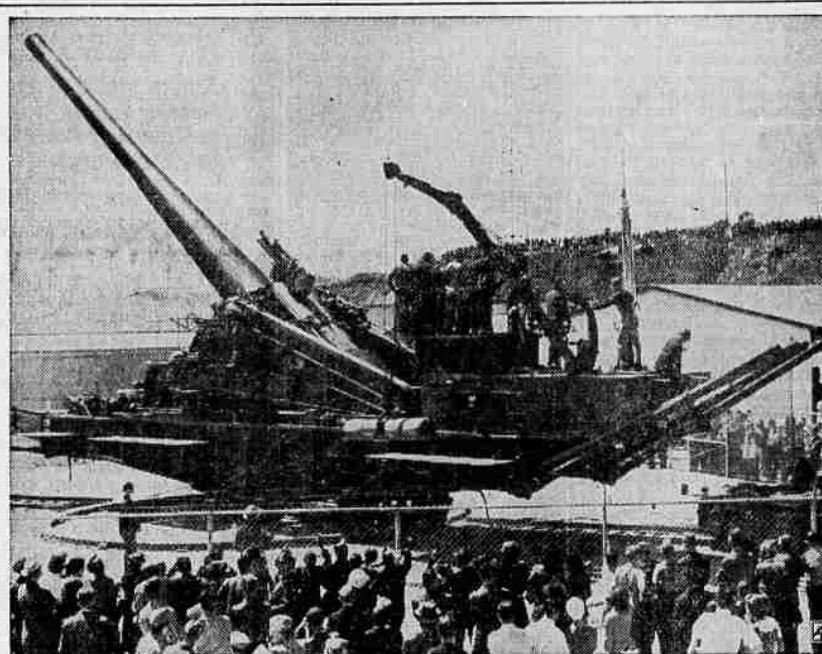
It had been reported that differences between health authorities and dairymen were all ironed out. But when the report of the committee recommending passage of the bill was read Hans Hofstetter,

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Council Creates South River Road Fund

The city council last night adopted a resolution creating the "South River road improvement fund" and accepted \$2000 from the Salem-Independence-Kings Valley highway association as a contribution toward the cost of acquiring right of way between Owens street and the south city limits. By the resolution the council transferred to the fund \$4000 from the fire tax fund.

Alderman O'Hara asked City Attorney Lawrence N. Brown if the council could legally transfer money from the fire tax fund. Brown said it was a "close question" but he believed it could be done. The argument on the resolution was lengthy. A roll call vote was asked for. Those voting no were Alderman Ross Goodman, Gertrude F. Lobdell, David O'Hara and E. B. Perrine.

The ordinance bill, authorizing the city attorney to start condemnation for the right of way got an affirmative vote from all but O'Hara and Perrine. The bill named E. B. Grabenhorst, James D. Sears and J. F. Ulrich as reviewers.

A letter from the Salem Trades and Labor council endorsed the enterprise but opposed it as a WPA project.

Salem Man Held at Albany

Lebanon, April 8—Robert Harris, 13, a seventh grade pupil of the Gore school, a mile north of here, is in a serious condition at the Lebanon hospital and Herman E. Kroepflin, of Salem, is in the county jail at Albany on a charge of driving while intoxicated, as a result of an accident in front of the school about 4 o'clock Monday afternoon.

Young Harris, son of Mr. and Mrs. Newton Harris, of Lebanon, was standing at the edge of the school grounds with other pupils when the car driven by Kroepflin swerved from the highway and struck him. Who stopped Kroepflin has not been determined by state police, but he was placed under arrest by Deputy Sheriff R. Oldham, Lebanon. He is being held pending final determination of the extent of the Harris boy's injuries.

The lad received severe lacerations of the left leg, right knee and lost two teeth. While he was reported in a favorable condition at the hospital today, it was believed that he was suffering from internal injuries, the extent of which may not be known for a day or two. The boy was taken to the hospital by Owen Peck, Lebanon route 2.

West Salem Council Acts on Franchise

West Salem, April 8—Rejection of the third reading of the franchise rights to the Portland General Electric company was unanimously voted by the city council at the meeting Monday night.

Previous to the third reading the courtesy of the floor was granted by Mayor Newgent to W. M. Hamilton, a representative of the Portland General Electric company, at which time he stated that his company would supply electricity for street lighting at a price equivalent to that of Canby and Forest Grove which have municipally owned plants. Mr. Pitts, a resident of the city for 41 years, reviewed the service of the company. Max Gehlhar, also granted the floor, spoke for the Salem Cooperative Power company, stating that their transmission lines met with the approval of the public utilities and carried current but two miles from the Bonneville substation and that at the present time the company had 175 members.

The following planning committee, J. S. Bowne, Max Gehlhar, Elmer Cook, Tom Dake and J. M. Six, appointed by the mayor, was approved by the city council. Elmer Cook selected to represent the city with the other members representative of varied business interests.

Max Gehlhar submitted a report on the feasibility of improvement of First street and volunteered to pay half the cost of improvement. The suggestion of extending First street through to Wallace road to relieve congested traffic on Edgewater street during operating season of the Oregon Fruit Packing company, was offered. The matter was referred to the street committee to investigate cost and necessity of improvement with authority to call a special council meeting if it was advisable.

A representative of a sign company presented plans of a city approval to construct a sign adjacent to the Puritan Market and one west of the Howell floral shop. The application was referred to the police committee for investigation. Also referred to committees was a petition of residents of Eighth street for the opening of a sewer system and the application of Harry Edward Walker for a beer license.

It was voted to replace the stop sign at Sixth and Rosemont street until residents petitioned for its removal. The city recorder was instructed to contact the state highway department concerning stop lights at several intersections on Edgewater street.

Attending the meeting were Mayor Newgent, Councilmen A. F. Goffrier, Joe Berry, Art Hathaway, Roy Stevens, Floyd Rudie and Don Kuhn.
