Managerial Charter Status Not Decided

Silverton — After waiting weeks for the approval of the \$13,000 WPA grant from Washington, D.C., Elgin McCleary, city manager, explained that the work of improving the water system on a number of streets of town, could not legally proceed even if the state sends out the crews, until the courts decide as to the validity or otherwise, of the new managerial charter.

The project, submitted early in February, planned for the laying of 4900 feet of mains, placing eight new steam-nozzles fire hydrants, and valves and service connections. The cost to the city would be around 60 per cent or \$7500.

Streets to be improved would include Johnson, 300 feet; Center, 300; South Madison, 300; and South Water, 4500. Cast iron pipes are to replace the old wooden structures laid in 1911.
