

Plylock Plant Officials Pay Albany Visit

Albany—Officials of the M. & M. Woodworking company of Portland came to Albany Thursday to witness operation of the new Albany Plylock corporation's plywood manufacturing plant and each expressed himself as highly pleased with the performance of the most modern plant of its kind.

Headed by J. A. Malarkey and Tom Autzen, who jointly control the M. & M. operations of which the Albany corporation is a subsidiary, the company officials spent the morning at the plant and in the afternoon went to Foster where they investigated timber tracts.

Machinery at the Albany mill was first turned Monday experimentally, after the steam turbine had been tested Sunday under supervision of Ray Hansen, chief engineer for the M. & M. interests.

First commercial production was planned early next week and the first carload of plywood is scheduled to leave the plant probably Tuesday, J. A. Malarkey said.

Plans for the formal opening of the plant late in May are meanwhile proceeding and an extensive local program is contemplated. Until then the plant will operate on a limited scale or until all adjustments have been made, whereupon full commercial operation will ensue.

In the party of M. & M. officials here Thursday in addition to Mr. Malarkey and Mr. Autzen were Herbert Huntington and Charles Malarkey, Mr. Hansen and Dewey Long, general superintendent. Tom Malarkey was to have been with the group but was delayed at Canby by an accident in which he was injured.

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Sewer Project Shows Progress
