

Crash Victims Are Improving At Lebanon

Lebanon — George Dumont, 16, Corvallis, and Marjorie Blakely, 14, Albany, were rushed to the Lebanon general hospital at midnight Sunday with injuries suffered when the motorcycle they were riding collided head-on with an automobile on the South Santiam highway a mile north of Lebanon.

Miss Blakely suffered a compound fracture of the left leg, her partner a dislocated left wrist and foot bruises and cuts. Driver of the car was Walter Cartwright of Sweet Home. Condition of the boy and girl was reported favorable Monday afternoon by hospital attendants.

Young Filer Recovers

Lebanon—Otto Ohm, Berlin, had recovered sufficiently from injuries received in a recent solo plane crash, to be released from the Lebanon general hospital Sunday. Ohm was taken to the hospital last Wednesday afternoon from the Swanson logging camp at Berlin, after suffering head and chest injuries when his Piper cub ship crashed down in the woods a mile from the camp.

Ohm, an Oregon State college student, enrolling as a part of his student pilot training course from the Albany airport when his ship crashed in a hall storm. The plane, located a day later by a searching party, was demolished.
