Silverton—Fourteen local Future Farmers were among the 512 from 52 high schools in Oregon who attended the 13th annual FFA convention held at Oregon State college at Corvallis.

Dale Herigstad and Amos Funnur were official delegates for the Silverton chapter in the business session. Also attending were George Haberly, Reuben Ditchen, Donald Jaquet, Marvin Dahl, Stanley Torvond, Walter McElhaney, Lee Reeder, John Lichty, Paul Dickman, Howard Mawer, Lewis Nicol, Richard Krenz, and the advisor, Leonard Hudson.

Silverton was one of 21 chapters to receive a keynote plaque for outstanding accomplishments during the past year. They were also successful in several of the judging contests. Dale Herigstad and Amos Funnur took first in poultry judging. As Amos was second high boy in the state, and A. J. Stone of the Corvallis chapter will represent Oregon at the national convention in Kansas City next October. Howard Mawer, George Haberly and Amos Funnur were third in livestock judging; John Lichty, Lee Reeder and Donald Jaquet were fifth in dairy judging; George Haberly, Reuben Ditchen and Donald Jaquet were the fifth farm management team.

In addition, Dale Herigstad and Amos Funnur received the gold charm emblematic of the state farmer degree, only 36 of which were given, and which indicates that a boy has at least \$250 invested in farming and is an outstanding member of his chapter.
