School Clinic For Monmouth

Monmouth—A pre-school clinic will be held Wednesday from 8:30 o'clock to noon at the Monmouth training school. The clinic is open to all children of pre-school age in Monmouth and in the rural districts of the vicinity between the ages of four and six years.

The clinic provides for a general physical examination with recommendations for corrections of any physical defects which can be made at leisure by parents before the child reaches school age. Since local physicians and dentists are giving their time, the examination is being made free of cost to the parents. There will be an opportunity to secure immunization from smallpox and diphtheria for a small cost due to the serum is secured without cost for pre-school clinic units from the state board of health.

The clinic is sponsored by Monmouth's newly organized Parent-Teacher association. The PTA committee consists of Miss Ruth McClure, Mrs. C. Winegar and Mrs. Oscar Groves. The committee has endeavored to contact all parents of pre-school age children. Any parents who may have been overlooked may register the child by calling the Monmouth training school or by bringing the child to the school on the morning of the clinic.

A health chairman has been named for each surrounding district for the purpose of contacting the eligible children.
