

Some Bad Men Among Aliens Says Jackson

Washington, May 7 (P)—Attorney General Jackson said today there were 6000 deportable aliens who are still "free" in the United States as he ordered a round-up of 160 German seamen for questioning.

The justice department revealed that officers had been directed to round-up the seamen who were supposed to be in New York, Miami, San Francisco, Philadelphia, Baltimore and Kansas City under an agreement permitting their freedom after deportation orders were completed but could not be executed for lack of machinery.

The department also said that 125 Italian seamen were taken from Ellis Island last night for Missoula, Mont., to be held in an army camp taken over there for detention of aliens. It is planned eventually to put all the interned Italians at the fort. The men are members of the crew of the Conte Biancamano, taken into protective custody in the Panama Canal zone.

The attorney general, in an address prepared for the American Judicature society, warned that "under modern methods of warfare the most critical period for a nation under attack is the period preceding the actual employment of military force."

The 160 seamen were on tankers of the Standard Oil company of New Jersey when they were transferred to Panamanian registry, a justice department official said. They were removed from the crews and the company agreed to provide upkeep for men, who were to maintain fixed residence, notify of any change of address, and follow other regulations as there was no way to deport them.

"They are now being picked up for questioning at the direction of the attorney general," the official said. "They will probably be held in custody for some time. Their final disposition has not been decided upon yet."

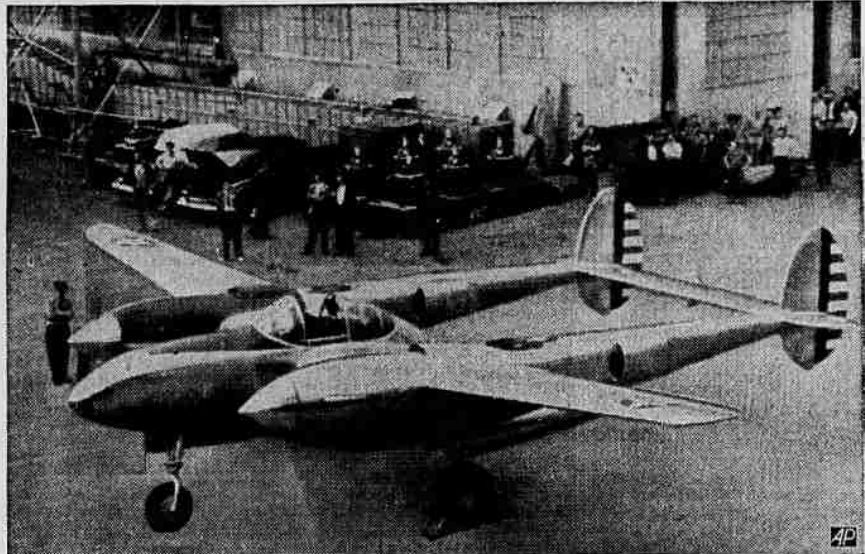
In his address, Jackson declared that "in the presence of threats to our national prestige and integrity our people will demand increased emphasis on the rights of the commonwealth."

"When public pressure develops for priority of the security of the state over the liberty of the individual," he said, it is a delicate task to keep public confidence and also steer a course "that will be approved by the sober second thought of the nation."

The department of justice, he asserted, is laboring under dual responsibilities: to protect the peace and dignity of the commonwealth, and "to protect and respect the rights of individuals to do many of the very things that may be steps in the process of undermining the stability of the commonwealth."

"It is certainly an open question," he said at one point in his address, "whether a liberty to abuse liberty does not generate a danger to liberty itself."

Urging the legal profession to help in "putting our legal defenses in order," Jackson declared "it is of utmost importance that our laws be made as effective as possible within constitutional and proper limitations."

Stalin Forsees Some Imminent Crisis

Joseph Stalin's surprising emergence from the privacy of the office where he has quietly but firmly pulled the strings of government, to assume the premiership of Russia, is far from self-explanatory, but it strikes me there is one assumption we can make safely—that he foresees some imminent crisis and has put himself in the slot to deal with it.

When we go further, however, and try to put a finger on the exact crisis he has in view we should move cautiously, for the mind of the Muscovite sphinx is a closed book excepting as he resorts to action. Still, there are several logical possibilities.

Among these I should put well to the fore the growing tension between the axis and the United States.

Stalin sees Washington's stiffened attitude, as evidenced by such developments as Secretary of War Stimson's plea for use of our navy to guarantee the success of the aid-to-Britain program. The communist leader notes the Nazi announcement that it is preparing to increase munitions production on the assumption that there is a possibility America may enter the war.

Maybe he, too, believes that the United States may get into the conflict. I don't know that. He would not be the chief of all the Russians, however, if he didn't have the foresight to prepare for such a contingency. That event would completely alter the complexion of the war, and would be bound to have a profound effect on the Soviet Union.

German Thrust
There is another matter which is of vast concern to Stalin. That is Germany's thrust into what Russia considers her preserves in the Balkans and on the Dardanelles, and the indications that Hitler may strike into the near east, thereby further menacing Soviet interests. Then there have been signs that Hitler is again looking with specu-

lative eyes on Russia's Ukraine. Possession of that productive state would give the Nazis vital supplies which they lack. Hitler's first move in that direction would mean war with the bolsheviks.

And there is still another possibility. Hitler is reported to be applying the heat to Japan to force her to make war on Britain and the United States in the far east, to create a diversion for the benefit of the European conflict. Stalin can't overlook that situation, which is full of dynamite for him.

Is the bolshevik chief thinking of sending his great army into action?

It would be rash to take that for granted, as I see the position. It is fair to assume, however, that he envisages that possibility and is getting set to meet the crisis if and when it develops.

South River Road Restaked By Engineers

A crew under State Highway Engineer Booth this morning restaked certain sections of the survey along the south river road right-of-way where stakes had been knocked over or disturbed, but mainly in places where property owners desired to see exactly what land they would have to surrender if they signed deeds granting easements for the roadway.

In addition, the staking also was done for the benefit of the appraisal committee of the Salem Realty board, which is expected to go out tomorrow at the request of the county court and make appraisals on properties not yet signed up.

The object of this is to give the county some basis on which to establish a valuation in case condemnation proceedings are instituted. To institute such proceedings, it is necessary for the county to establish a value and make an offer to the property owner on that basis. The amount offered is tendered in the complaint when condemnation proceedings are instituted and the property owner, if he decides to resist the court proceedings, in turn sets up in his answer what he considers the property is worth. Trial is had by jury and the jury fixes the value.

However, when proceedings of this nature are instituted, the work can be started immediately without awaiting the outcome of the trial. If work is started the county is then bound to pay whatever price is determined by the jury.

Court members said today there are still five or six pieces on which it is uncertain whether the property owners will sign up or will force the matter to condemnation by refusing to make an earlier settlement.

Workers Accept Wage Offer

Silverton, Ore., May 7—Increase of 7 1/2 cents per hour offered a week ago by the management of the Silver Falls Lumber company was accepted last night by the Silverton local of the Industrial Employees union. The members, according to Ed Lambert, secretary, will continue negotiations for the remaining 2 1/2 cents of the 10 cents an hour increase originally asked.

Negotiations have been under way for the last three weeks between the mill management and the conference committee of the local, with a five-cent increase first offered the men.

The Industrial Hospital association of Portland, by a two to one vote, was accepted for members' non-occupational cases. Three Portland hospitals submitted offers. Place of meeting in the future will be the Knights of Pythias instead of the Woodmen of the World hall.
