

## Parking Edict Is Approved For Lebanon

Lebanon — Adding teeth to current efforts to clean up Lebanon's long endured downtown traffic tie-ups, the city council Tuesday night passed a one-hour parking ordinance covering three blocks on Main street from Maple to Ash, running north and south, and Sherman street for a half block on each side of Main, extending east and west.

The one-hour limit will be enforced daily except Sundays and holidays from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. with a \$10 maximum penalty provided for violations.

The council also voiced approval of a plan submitted by the city's new police chief, Mike Southard, to establish 10-minute parking zones on the corners of busy Main street intersections to facilitate "hurry-up" shopping. An ordinance to that effect was requested by the council to be presented at its next session.

In several other actions, the council gave assent to a new siren for the police chief's car, four red and green blinker lights for the two fire trucks, and a five-man increase in fire department personnel, raising the quota to 30 volunteer firemen.

Almon Temple, Lebanon, was appointed on a full-time basis to the fire department, marking the first time in the city's history that the department has had a salaried fireman. Temple will begin his duties May 15, according to John Zimbrick of the fire committee.

The council accepted a petition and called for plans and specifications to fill five blocks of Oak street from Second street to the city limits, with the cost to be borne by property owners and the city.

Meanwhile, plans to revamp the city's building code moved ahead, on the report of Councilman Elmer Fitzgerald, who recommended that the new code follow one laid out by the National Board of Fire Insurance Underwriters.

No recommendation was made to appoint a councilman to replace Frank "Hap" Southard, who left last Sunday for the army in his capacity of reserve officer.

## Polk Deputy Quits After Long Service

Dallas — Sheriff T. B. Hooker announced this week that he has accepted the resignation of W. W. (Bill) Williams, criminal deputy in his department for the past eight years.

Williams is moving to Portland where he plans to locate although he has not revealed any definite plans for the future.

Previous to coming to Dallas he was a member of the state police and he enjoys an enviable record as a peace officer. Hooker also made it public that he has appointed Tony Neufeldt, Dallas police chief, to the post left vacant by the departure of Williams.

## Joint Airport Only Solution to Future

Albany — Albany must either join with Corvallis in procuring and equipping a jointly owned and operated airport or probably retire from the aviation picture so far as the United States government and transportation operators are concerned, Paul Morris, Seattle, civil aeronautics administration airport engineer, told a committee of Albany men Wednesday. Morris consulted with Mayor A. G. Sanders, and Arch Lindley, representing the city council, I. A. McDowell and Carl Curlee, representing the Chamber of Commerce, preliminary to an Albany-Corvallis council session attended by Mayor Sanders and Councilman Lindley Wednesday afternoon.

Morris stated that the CAA is not likely to be interested in contributing to the development of two class 3 airports in such proximity as the Albany and an abandoned Corvallis field would be.

Inasmuch as the Corvallis bond issue will provide adequate space for a usable airport the Corvallis field will undoubtedly be favored when federal aid is applied, Morris asserted. He added that the Albany airport, as it stands, is inadequate for transport or military aviation activities.

Had Albany kept abreast of aviation and proceeded with expansion as need arose the town's present quandary would probably have never arisen, Morris declared. Morris charged that Albany has been remiss in failing aggressively to push development of local facilities and to offer cooperation with the government defense program.

Accompanying Morris was State Aeronautics Inspector Devaney. These two were also in attendance at the meeting in Corvallis.

## School Costs Above Budget Albany Finds

Albany — Taxpayers of Albany school district No. 5 will be called upon to contribute an additional \$3400 above last year's costs for maintaining the district school system, but the increase is largely in anticipation of an expected increase in demands upon teaching staff and facilities.

The district budget board Tuesday adopted a budget which calls for the raising of \$98,735 by taxation and for the total expenditure of \$159,135. The committee assigned \$91,555 for instruction, an increase of \$2605, involved in a slight salary increase and in expectation of possible necessity of increasing the staff. Addition of \$500 to the emergency fund, now \$1500, is included in the increase, as is the increase of \$6000 allotted to bond principle payments.
