

Club Exhibits Break Record, Oakville Wins

Albany, May 9.—All records for volume of exhibits were shattered at the 1941 spring 4-H club fair Friday, when more than 500 specimens of 4-H club achievements throughout Linn county were literally jammed into the Veterans' Memorial hall.

O. E. Mikesell, county club agent, said that henceforth the memorial hall will be too small to hold the exhibits and was taking steps toward insuring the Albany armory which is more commodious for the 4-H club fairs.

Both the main hall and anteroom are teeming with exhibits, and there was insufficient room on the walls of the smaller room to accommodate the posters.

Judging of the exhibits was made Friday and Saturday, the concluding day, the show is to be open to the public.

Band Contest Held

Albany.—The Oakville community which entered the Bell Plain Rhythm band won the cup over Friday night in the final event of the county-wide observance of National Music week, in the annual community night contest at the Albany high school auditorium. The Sand Ridge community school student body, winners of first place for the past two years, took second place and the Grand Prairie Grange community was awarded third place.

Sand Ridge won the special prize for having present the most persons.

On Thursday night Halsey musicians and singers, who took second place last year in the "Town Night" competition, won first place, with second place in the town's contest being awarded to Tangent and third to Harrisburg, with five towns competing.

Brownsville, with 49 representatives in the auditorium, traveling a total of 1176 man-miles, won a special prize.

Friday night's contest culminated a series of music week events which it is commonly stated have marked the 1941 observance as the most outstanding recognition ever given the occasion in this area.
