Hess Captured by Scottish Plowman

Glasgow, Scotland, May 13 (U.P.)—David McLean, Scottish plowman who "captured" Rudolf Hess with a hay fork, was a hero of the war today and his cottage on the moors a few miles from Glasgow became a center of wide interest.

It was only last night that the McLeans—David, his mother and his sister—knew the identity of the man who came down by parachute near their cottage.

I had heard of the landing of a mysterious German aviator at the McLean farm and I hastened there with pictures of Hess. I put them before a score of people who had talked with him. They identified him long before the London announcement that Hess was the flying visitor.

They also emphasized that he seemed completely in his right mind and that he was glad to be out of Germany.

"Sure, that's the man," McLean said when I showed him Hess' picture. "No doubt about it," said his mother. "So we had a distinguished visitor after all."

Orderlies at the military hospital to which Hess was taken for a time said that his toenails had been carefully manicured.

The McLeans and others at the farm were thrilled and excited at being the center of a world story.

"We knew when he came into the cottage and spoke to us in excellent English that he was a man of personality and was accustomed to command," Mrs. McLean said. "He had compelling eyes."

"When the home guards arrived to take him away in a truck he was the coolest man in the kitchen."

David McLean said that Hess' ankle was not broken but that it was bruised. He had a slight chafe on his neck from his parachute harness, McLean added.

Hess displayed many gold teeth when he smiled, McLean said. He and his mother pointed to Hess' gold wrist watch. On the other wrist, they said, he wore a gold compass. His clothing and flying equipment were of the finest quality, they emphasized.

Southern Mob Lynches Negro

Quincy, Fla., May 13 (U.P.)—Sheriff M. P. Luten said today "five or six" white men had lynched A. C. Williams, negro accused of attempted criminal assault on a 12-year-old white girl.

The negro was suffering from a beating administered Sunday night when he was abducted the second time and killed. Sheriff Luten said the lynching party took Williams from an ambulance on the highway north of here last night and shot him "eight to 10 times." His body was found this morning.

Williams had been arrested early Sunday on charges of attempted rape and that night a group of white men went to the Gadsden county jail here and forced Deputy Dan Davis to turn over the prisoner, Luten said.

They locked Davis in the jail and disappeared with Williams. Yesterday, Williams staggered into town bleeding from several bullet wounds and bruised from an apparent beating.

"I fixed him up," the sheriff said, "and sent him by ambulance to Tallahassee so he could get hospital attention."

"But about six miles north of town five or six white men stopped the ambulance and forced Will Webb, the driver, to let them have Williams," the sheriff said. "Webb came back to town and reported what happened and I went out this morning and found the body. Williams had been shot eight or 10 times."

40,000 Troops Plan March to California

Fort Lewis, May 13 (AP)—More than 40,000 troops began 11th hour preparations today for departure to California war games as the 3rd division completed its training schedule by routing a theoretical "red" enemy in a vigorous dawn attack.

In a full offensive battle that began late yesterday, the third, supported by anti-aircraft and cavalry troops, hurled back a mechanized enemy division. During the engagement, approximately 15,000 men fought under realistic conditions.

During one phase of the battle they were forced to hastily don gas masks as umpires set off smoke and tear gas bombs. It was total war except for the squeaking of triggers and the actual firing of field artillery.

Both Major Generals Kenyon A. Joyce, ninth corps commander, and Charles F. Thompson, third division head, termed the final maneuver a seven month training period "highly successful."

While the weary third returned to camp, the 41st division cantonment was buzzing with preparations for the California departure. Thousands of trucks were being serviced for the motorized march that will start Monday.

Advance troops were to leave tonight to establish truck, train and railroad depots at King City, Calif., near the Hunter Liggett reservation where the month-long war games will start June 1. Motorized units will take six days for the California trip. The first troop trains, bearing infantry troops primarily, will start leaving May 23.

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Chadwick Dedicates New Legion Home

Regardless of the course the nation may pursue, unity and strength are the primary needs of America today, declared Stephen F. Chadwick, of Seattle, past national commander of the American Legion. In dedicating the new \$21,000 home of Capital Post No. 9 last night. To this end the American Legion is now dedicating itself and insists that division on social questions shall not delay the strengthening of national defense, he said.

The speaker reiterated the stand taken recently by the national executive committee in that the president be frank with the people of the nation; that a change be made in the labor post of the cabinet and that serikies in defense industries be no longer tolerated.

"I have never seen a nation so divided," Chadwick said in voicing a plea for understanding on the part of workers in defense industries but the lives of their sons is the issue; and while adhering to the Legion's principle that no undue profits be made because of war or the threat of war, he pointed out that profits can be taken away later, wages may also be adjusted—but the one thing that is being squandered beyond all recall is the element of time.

Extending greetings were Governor Charles A. Sprague, Mayor W. W. Chadwick, Alfred P. Kelly, Oswego, state commander and Mrs. Josephine Kane, Dundee, district president of the auxiliary. Others seated on the platform were Secretary of State Earl Snell; State Treasurer Leslie M. Scott; Mrs. Harold Perkins, president of Capital Unit; B. E. (Kelly) Owens, president of the Federated Patriotic Societies and Brazier C. Small, district commander and representative of the building committee. Musical numbers were given by the post glee club and the auxiliary quartet. Open house for the public was held from 6 to 8 o'clock with many remaining for the dedication program.

Building Permits For Month Reported

San Francisco, May 13 (U.P.)—Building permits issued in 95 Pacific coast cities in April totaled \$37,615,643, a gain of 16.2 per cent over the corresponding 1940 month but a decline of 21.4 percent from March totals, H. R. Baker & Co., San Francisco investment banking firm, reported today. Permits in March totaled \$47,887,885 and in April, 1940, the total was \$32,362,677.
