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Public Assistance Strings Tightened

Albany — Employable persons now getting public assistance will have greater difficulty in doing so in the future as a result of a resolution on policy adopted this week by the Linn county public welfare commission. It is announced by John Beard, county welfare administrator.

Generally improved employment conditions and a threatened shortage of labor for seasonal harvesting in Linn county means that "any able-bodied person should and be employed for the seasonal work period," the commission resolution stated. Public assistance funds, it continued, will not be available for persons who themselves or members of whose families are able to assist in harvesting crops. The same policy is to be followed in certifying applicants for WPA employment.

Magazine Reader Misses Issues After 60 Years

With the March issue the "Advocate and Family Guardian" ceased further publication.

Mrs. Murdoch has enjoyed the magazine as long as she can remember, for her mother subscribed to it during her lifetime. When Mrs. Murdoch married an aunt presented her with a \$25 life subscription. "In the early days it was often the only paper we read, and magazines and reading matter were not as plentiful then as now," said Mrs. Murdoch in voicing her regret.

The magazine has been published monthly since 1834 by the American Female Guardian society and Home of the Friendless in New York City. The home, which has sheltered nearly 50,000 little inmates, is undenominational and the work from the first has been carried on by women.

Joint Airport Not in Sight

Albany — Albany's city council Wednesday night decided that public sentiment in Albany favoring a joint airport for Albany and Corvallis is not strong enough to warrant calling a special bond election to finance Albany's share in such an undertaking. Mayor A. G. Sanders was instructed to communicate the decision to Mayor H. W. Hand of Corvallis.

Corvallis recently voted bonds for building a municipal airport. The proposal for a joint airport between the two cities, first proposed last year when the C.A.A., announced a civil airport improvement program was renewed when a C.A.A. official told Corvallis and Albany city officials that the chances of getting federal money for an airport in this section of the Willamette valley would be better if the cities united on a project.

The majority of the Albany councilmen favor spending any additional money voted for airport purposes on expansion of the present municipal airport, where all flying instruction is now given under the Oregon State college participation in the C.A.A. civilian pilot training program.

Cutting of Timber May Prove Costly

Albany — The recovery of thousands of dollars due Linn county in delinquent taxes on land from which timber is being cut is expected to result from a check being made by County Assessor W. C. Templeton.

Cutting timber from delinquent tax land is punishable by a penalty of double liability and a possible fine if prosecution is necessary in collecting the taxes.

One operator, detected in the practice, has already paid \$1200 while another faces the possibility of paying over \$10,000 when the extent of his cutting on delinquent tax land is determined.

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
