Officials Say Linn County to Feel Army Camp

Albany — If there is any truth in the voluminous conjecturing about the army cantonment proposed for the Eugene area, Linn county should be showing more concern than Lane county, reports County Judge J. J. Barrett, County Clerk Rufus Russell and County Agent Floyd C. Mullen, who attended a meeting concerning the cantonment held Wednesday night at Eugene.

If the cantonment should be established at all and in accord with current rumors, they said, over half of the reported 70,000 acre area would be in Linn county, including some fine farm lands in the southern part of the county.

Unofficial reports, they said, favor boundary lines about like this: on the north extending east from a point about a mile and a half south of Halsey and a mile or more east of the Southern Pacific main line into the Cascade foothills; from the west end of the northern line to a point about two miles north of Corvallis; then east again into the mountains to form the southern line.
