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How and When To Prepare Spicy Pickles

Many requests have been received in regard to pickle making and not all of the writers live in the suburbs either. There is no reason, of course, why pickles cannot be made in the apartment house kitchen, despite the fact that city dwellers are not supposed to be interested in this.

You will believe quite the contrary if you sniff the air filled with that spicy scent which tells the world that pickles are cooking.

The time to make pickles is when you find materials plentiful in the market. This period may be short, so take advantage when you see good vegetables at a low price. Don't wait until the next week, as you may pass up the best. This is particularly true in the case of little gherkins, as the dry spell may take them off the market.

Bread and Butter Pickles

12 cucumbers (about six inches long)
5 medium-sized onions
1/2 cup salt
2 cups water
2 cups vinegar
1 1/2 cups sugar
1 1/2 teaspoons mustard seed
1 teaspoon celery seed
Wash vegetables. Cut cucumbers in 1/2-inch slices without paring. Peel onions and cut in 1/2-inch slices. Place layers of sliced vegetables alternately in bowl with salt. Let stand three hours. Drain and rinse well with cold water. Mix water, vinegar, sugar and mustard and celery seeds in large kettle, and bring to boiling, stirring until sugar is dissolved. Add drained cucumbers and onions, and boil five minutes. Pour into hot sterilized jars and seal immediately. Yield, about three quarts.

Mustard Pickles

2 quarts green tomatoes

2 large heads cauliflower
6 sweet red peppers
1 cup carrot strips
1 quart small white onions
1 quart very small cucumbers
1 cup salt
1 quart cold water
1 cup flour
3 cups sugar
2 teaspoons turmeric
1/2 cup dry mustard
2 cups water
1 1/2 cups vinegar
2 teaspoons celery seed
Wash vegetables. Cut tomatoes in eighths. Break cauliflower into small flowerets. Cut peppers in quarters, remove stem ends, seeds and fibrous white portion. Wash and peel on-

ions. Mix vegetables in large bowl, cover with brine made by combining salt with cold water. Let stand twelve to sixteen hours. Bring vegetables to a boil in same water and drain. Rinse well with cold water. Mix flour, sugar, turmeric and mustard. Add water slowly and blend to a smooth paste. Heat vinegar to boiling and add to flour mixture, stirring constantly. Add celery and mustard seeds. Pack drained vegetables in hot sterilized jars, and pour hot mustard over them. Seal immediately. Yield, about five quarts.

Gherkins
2 quarts small cucumbers (about 1 1/2 to 2 inches long)
2 quarts boiling water

1/2 cup salt
1 teaspoon powdered alum
3 quarts cold water
2 cups vinegar
1 cup sugar
2 teaspoons whole cloves
1 three-inch stick cinnamon, broken in pieces
2 teaspoons mustard seed
1 teaspoon celery seed
Wash cucumbers. Dissolve salt in boiling water and cool. Add cucumbers and let stand twenty-four hours. Drain and rinse well with cold water. Dissolve alum in cold water, add cucumbers, and soak two hours. Drain and rinse. Bring vinegar, sugar and spices to boiling, stirring until sugar is dissolved. Pack

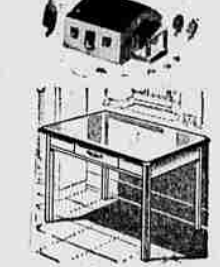
cucumbers in hot jars, pour hot syrup over them and seal. Yield, about two quarts.

Rust Remover
Remove rust stains from iron porch furniture with steel wool and then go over with kerosene on a cloth. Never attempt to paint over rust stains; they will burst through the paint and look worse than before.

Starched clothes should be allowed to dry, then dampened, rolled up for an hour or so and ironed.

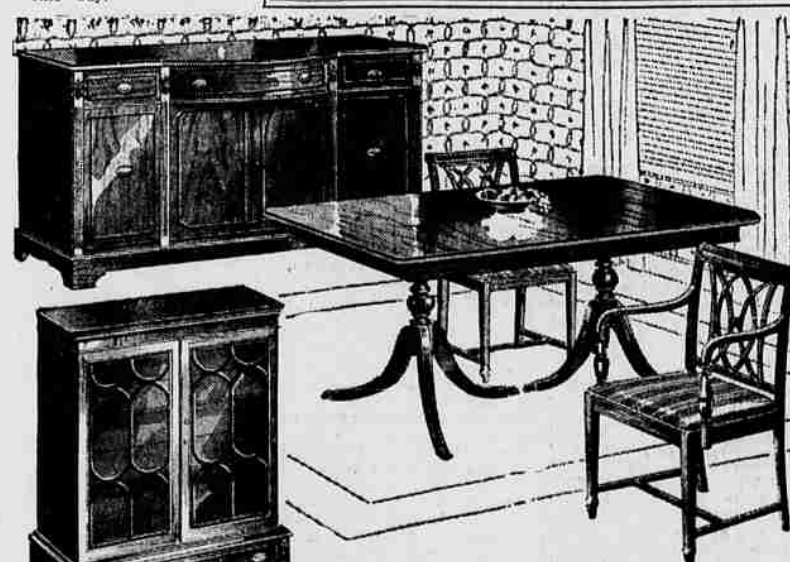

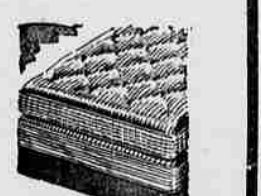
