Blast at Sitka Navy Base Kills 6, Injures 15

Sitka, Alaska, Oct. 13 (AP)—The terrific explosion of 43,000 pounds of dynamite at 1:30 p.m. yesterday killed five soldiers and a marine and injured at least 15 others at the vital Sitka naval station on Japonski Island. Civilians in Sitka, three miles away on Baranof Island, were showered with falling glass and an unestimated number injured as buildings at both the air base and in the city cracked from the concussion.
 Navy officials said damage caused by the blast was limited to the loss of the dynamite, broken glass and doors blown in by the concussion.
 The 15 individuals known to have been injured were five navy men, six civil service employees, two employees of the contractor (Siemens Drake Puget Sound company), an army private and the wife of a contractor's employee.
 The six dead were members of a fire-fighting crew which rushed to battle a grass fire just as the flames reached an underground magazine where the dynamite was stored.
 Naval officials listed the army victims as Capt. Francis C. Allen, provost marshal and former official of the Standard Oil company of California at San Francisco, whose home is at Kentfield, Calif.; Private Ralph E. Kirkbridge, Los Gatos, Calif.; Private Frank E. Hayton, San Francisco; Private Albert A. Spurling, Everett, Wash., and Hedley C. Eastbrook, whose rank and home address were not given. The sixth victim was a marine, Private Thomas A. Bakum, whose father lives at Murfreesboro, Tenn.
 Among the injured were Private Lester B. Kirk, home ungiven, who suffered a severe case of shock, a Sergeant Crosby and a Mrs. Roche, wife of a contractor's employee, who was badly cut by flying glass and may lose an eye.
 The earth-shaking blast came just as benediction was being pronounced in the famous old Russian church at Sitka at 12:10 p.m. The concussion shattered broken window glass over the parishioners, injured dozens on the narrow Sitka streets and sent 15 to the air base hospital. The station at Millerville, close by the base, was denuded of its windows and many of the homes recently built to house personnel of the \$5,000,000 base—called vital to Pacific defenses—were badly damaged.
 The navy declined to give many details of damage inside the air station itself and did not reveal whether huge hangars built within the last year suffered damage.

Cantonment Plan Completion Dates Extended

Completion dates on pre-planning for four army camps—at Medford, Ore., Corvallis, Ore., Marysville, Calif., and West Yellowstone, Mont.—have been extended beyond the original schedule upon instructions from the quartermaster general, it was announced at the office of the zone constructing quartermaster in San Francisco today. So far as is known, construction of these proposed camps, in the event that all studies establish the availability of the sites, is contingent upon the expansion of the nation's armed forces.
 Architect-engineers have been working on the 78,000-acre site in the vicinity of Medford since May 5. Completion date for this work has been extended from September 30 to October 20. Plans and specifications are now 85 percent complete. Thousands of pages of descriptive work, contract documents, specifications and prints have been prepared. Office personnel has been considerably reduced from a high of 170 persons, and the small force of draftsmen remaining is engaged on previously submitted plans and necessary corrections. Construction on the basis of present plans can begin immediately, when authorized.
 Planning on the 70,000-acre site at Marysville, originally scheduled for completion on September 30, is 60 percent finished. As in the case of the Medford project, instructions from the quartermaster general have caused the completion date to be set forward to November 17.
 The West Yellowstone winter-training site, a 118,000-acre tract 113 miles south of Bozeman, has progressed to the 10 percent stage, with 355 persons employed in extensive pre-planning. The completion date has been advanced from November 8 to December 8.
 Architect-engineers John W. Cunningham & Associates and Lawrence & Allen of Portland, Ore., after working on plans for a triangular division camp at Eugene, Ore., transferred their activities 40 miles northwest, to the vicinity of Corvallis, where they have been established since August 23. Plans and specifications are about complete. As in the case of the other three projects, completion time has been extended to October 18.
 Meanwhile, newly designated Camp Cooke, in the Santa Maria-Lompoc, Calif., area, latest camp to go under construction in the ninth zone, is making rapid progress. Ground-breaking ceremonies were held on September 14 in cooperation with the Santa Barbara county publicity bureau. Construction is expected to be finished about January 7, 1942. The reservation embraces 97,000 acres and 32 miles of coast line. When the full complement of troops has arrived, the population will be almost that of the city of Santa Barbara.
