

Meeting Here Tonight to Talk Contracts

Defense contract problems will be discussed at a meeting of Salem firms that handle, or are capable of handling contracts of that kind to be held at the Chamber of Commerce tonight, beginning at 8 o'clock.

Lee U. Eyerly of the Eyerly Aircraft corporation, who arranged for the meeting, said the discussion is open to all persons interested in securing defense contracts of any kind.

The meeting is a follow up of a conference held at the statehouse last week by Salem manufacturers and machine shop operators on invitation of the Oregon economic council.

At tonight's meeting R. B. Turner of Portland, who represents the federal office of production management, will talk on problems of defense contracts. He is expected to give an outline of new government plans for spreading defense work to make use of idle machine capacity and furnish employment in areas where the defense priority system has reduced normal production.

Also participating will be W. H. Baillie, manager of the Salem office of the state employment service, and W. H. Crawford, executive secretary of the Oregon economic council.

Legion Will Attend Church

Members of Capital Post No. 9, American Legion, last night accepted the invitation of Rev. J. C. Harrison to attend church services Armistice Sunday, November 9, at the First Methodist church.

Following the parade the post will dedicate its new flag pole at the American Legion home and join with the auxiliary for a dinner at noon. A dance, the only revenue feature of the day, will be held at Crystal Gardens as usual.

Jobless Benefits for Seasonable Workers

The Oregon unemployment compensation commission lost a supreme court case today which the commission said might cause depletion of its reserve fund out of which jobless benefits are paid.

The decision ordered that benefits be paid to Thomas Layman, faller and bucker for the Crown Zellerbach corporation, for January and February, 1938, when the corporation shut down operations at its Lewis and Clark logging operation in Clatsop county. The commission had denied him benefits on the grounds that during those

months, the corporation ordinarily shuts down operations because it is seasonal.

Circuit Judge Howard K. Zimmerman, sitting in Multnomah county, upheld the commission, but the supreme court, in today's decision by Justice Lusk, held that the commission exceeded its authority in making the seasonality determination.

"The plea that the fund may be depleted if the commission's decision is not sustained, and that excessive benefit payments are being made in the logging industry," it might well be addressed to the legislature, but, we think, have no place here or before the commission," the opinion said.

"If the statute is not workable, then the remedy is with the legislature, which apparently has already seen the necessity of change in respect of particular provisions with which we have been dealing," it continued.

Under the unemployment compensation law's seasonality clause, amended by the 1941 legislature, men who work in seasonal industries are not paid benefits during seasons in which these industries are closed down. The supreme court decision showed that the corporation had operated during January and February of some years, hence it could not be classified as seasonal.

Other decisions today:
Clive L. Kiddle lost his damage suit against the Alaska Junk Co., for an accident in which Kiddle's car crashed into the back of a company truck near Portland. The decision, reaffirming a previous decision by the court, upheld Circuit Judge Robert Tucker of Multnomah county. The opinion was by Justice Bailey, with Justices Rossman and Rand dissenting.

D River Bridge Will Be Rebuilt
The DeLake bridge over the D river, washed out Saturday by high tides, will be rebuilt immediately, the state highway commission said today.

The broken bridge was 190 feet long and of wood construction. The new bridge will be similar. Traffic on the coast highway now is being detoured in that area.
