The Tri-County Chiropractic auxiliary met simultaneously with the Chiropractic Physicians for a no-host dinner at the Monmouth hotel Saturday night.

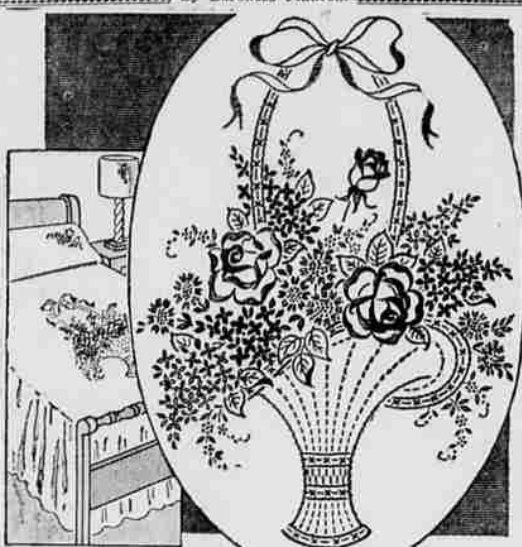

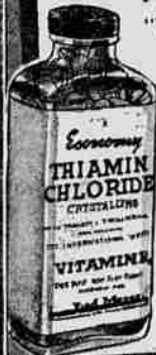

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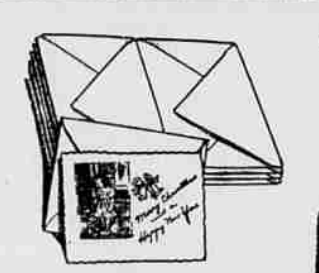
