Red Cross Roll Call Off to Good Start

The Red Cross roll call for 1941 membership began this week with three regional conferences. Floyd Miller serving as chairman of the roll call committee. The first meeting was held Monday in Jefferson, representing seven districts, with 39 in attendance. Milton L. Meyers of Salem presided. Mr. Miller conducted the meeting at Woodburn Wednesday, at which six districts were represented, and also presided at the general community meeting in Silverton last night.

Speakers at the conferences were Nancy Brown and Verletta Jacobson, who stressed the importance of the Junior Red Cross which, for the first time, is conducted in the junior schools the same as in the senior groups.

In connection with the roll call activities Miss Mary Jones, administrative staff assistant from San Francisco, has been in the city on special assignment. Miss Jones, who left for her home in the south last night, stated that there is fine indication for "all out" success in the annual roll. Organization heads expect to reach membership peak equal to that in 1917, when 22,000, 000 people belonged to the Red Cross. At present they are asking 15 per cent of the nation to join, which means that the membership in Marion county should be 11,189. It is imperative in this drive for folk to recognize the fact that they must "volunteer" to join.

Miss Jones spoke to the students at Salem high school at a "kick-off" meeting Wednesday and was assured that joiners there will be 100 per cent. Roll call in the grade schools is determined by rooms and in the senior high school by 100 students.

Too much emphasis cannot be placed upon the need for a speedy completion of the drive and for it not to drag out. The time limit set is November 11 to 30. This year, too, it is important for each member of the family to join—not to depend upon "father" to take one membership for the whole family.

Suggestions for the Thanksgiving Leftovers

You'll give thanks for Thanksgiving left-overs when you taste this delicious cranberry turkey mold, made with turkey left from Thanksgiving dinner. And this two-tone mold is grand party fare for the week-end following the Thursday.

Cranberry Turkey Mold

Part 1
1 tablespoon gelatin
2 tablespoons cold water
2 cups turkey broth
1 teaspoon grated onion
salt and pepper to taste
1 cup finely diced celery
2 cups diced, cold turkey
2 chopped pimientos
Soften gelatin in cold water and dissolve in hot turkey broth (made from boiled and strained turkey bones). Add onion and seasonings to taste; cool until slightly thickened. Fold in remaining ingredients. Half fill fancy mold rubbed with salad oil and chill. When almost firm, add Part 2 of recipe:

Part 2
1½ cups sugar
1½ cups water
1 lb. 4 cups cranberries
2 pinch stick cinnamon
6 whole cloves
grated rind of 1 orange
1 tablespoon gelatin
2 tablespoons cold water
1 cup finely diced apple
1 cup chopped Brazil nuts



Dissolve sugar in water; bring to boiling point and add cranberries, spices and orange rind. Cook slowly until cranberry skins pop open. Put through fine sieve. Soften gelatin in cold water and dissolve in hot cranberry mixture. Cool. When slightly thickened, fold in apples and nuts; pour in mold on top of turkey gelatin. Chill until firm. Unmold on lettuce and serve with mayonnaise blended with whipped cream and seasoned lightly with horseradish. Serves 6-8.
