Defense Work At Jefferson Keeps Interest

Jefferson—Local citizens are busy with defense work and every precaution is being taken by the local defense corps and the necessary measure of defense and blackout is being enforced. This blackout includes those living in the rural districts as well as in the cities.

Fifteen soldiers from Fort Lewis, under Lieutenant Ralph L. Boyes, are billeted in the city hall and will remain indefinitely for 24 hour duty guarding the Pacific highway and Southern Pacific railroad bridges over the Santiam river here. Guarding of the bridges began Sunday night following word of the Japanese attack on Hawaii. Guards were furnished by the Southern Pacific and the local civilian defense workers, who were on duty until the soldiers arrived from Fort Lewis.

A group of men from Jefferson attended the meeting in Salem of civilian workers this week. Another meeting of civil defense workers is scheduled for Tuesday night in Salem.

This community has been asked to contribute \$100 toward expenses incidental to defense work in Marion county.

Jefferson received word Thursday that \$225 has been set as its quota of the \$50,000,000 war relief campaign just instituted by the American Red Cross. So far, no one has been named to solicit this community, which includes Jefferson, Talbot, Looney Butte, Parrish Gap and Greens Bridge.
