

# Home Extension Unit Organized At Silverton

Silverton—A Silverton home extension unit was organized Thursday afternoon when Miss Frances Clinton, Marion county home demonstration agent, was special guest at the home of Mrs. Charles Davis, Mill street, in explaining the work during emergency plans, and the ways in which this may be brought to the attention of various groups of women.

Tentative plans were made for the first meeting of the unit to be March 4, at 2 o'clock in some room of the Eugene Field building, with Miss Hannah Olson to announce further details for the place of meeting and a speaker to come from the Salem office to start the unit in plans for gardening and to arrange for other subjects to be brought up, seasonally, and as the members request.

Miss Clinton said that individual information might be received by calling at the Salem old high school building at the Church street entrance. She explained in detail the four types of project submitted to units with from a full day's program to a few hours' time being given to the class each month in discussing good nutrition, food preparation, gardening and food preservation.

Many other types of helpful home projects that are brought to the women of Marion county were mentioned, among which were house furnishing, home management, work in the homes, the broad field of the question of clothing in making and care, health, recreation, etc.

Miss Clinton's telling of the value of synthesis in replacing many of the natural products now needed for the duration projects brought to light the use of the soybean as a substitute and other interesting materials now being manufactured from synthetic products.

# Truck Route Thru Lebanon Being Sought

Lebanon—City Recorder George H. Randle has written the state highway commission asking for additional funds for improvement of a trucking route through the city.

The proposed route will be by way of Milton street to Williams, thence north to Wheeler and west to the highway. State funds were recently approved for this route using Elmore street instead of Milton, but since Elmore street passes Queen Anne school, the new route was deemed advisable by the city council. Additional funds would be for the section on Williams between Milton and Elmore streets.

# Polk Political Pot Simmers But Not Boils

Dallas—One month to go until the deadline and there is still little evidence of activity along political row which might be of interest to residents of Polk county.

Lyle Thomas, state representative, publicized the fact this week that he would make his intentions known within the next few days, a statement taken by some as definite assurance that he would again be in the race.

Thomas already has one opponent in Mrs. Joe Rogers, Sr., all set and ready for the primaries. From the democratic side of the fence there has been whisperings but nothing concrete to work on.

Among the county offices, and there are several on the block for disposal by the voters, the situation appears to be somewhat muddled. There are indications, however, that there is likely to be some spirited competition for the office of county judge, now held by Herman Van Well.

Tracy Staats, an old time democrat is first in the field with a challenge to the incumbent if he decides to again contest the office. Van Well has not said yes or no and is hiding his time in the matter. Frank E. Kersey, republican candidate, is a certain starter for the county judge spot. Some of the experts have pooh-poohed the idea but Kersey is certainly flirting with the prospects with the thought of election and those who have his confidence are predicting that he is likely to file any old time.

Fred Gibson, whose term as county commissioner expires this year, is non-committal. Gibson indicates he plans to give the matter very serious consideration and will not show his hand for the time being at least.
