Huskies Beat Beavers, Ducks Drop to Cellar

With the second place the immediate stake and contention with Washington State for leadership the ultimate goal, the Washington Huskies and Oregon State Beavers will re-

self to the O.S.C. cause, Ford had 13 points and slim Norm Dalthorp 10.

The Huskies tied with O.S.C. for second place in northern division Pacific Coast conference standings last night by outrunning and outshooting the Beavers, 47 to 40. Both clubs now are a game behind W.S.C.

Meanwhile, at Moscow, the University of Idaho Vandals climbed from the division cellar for the first time in two seasons by losing to Oregon in a rough tilt, 38 to 36, and shoving the Oregonians into the basement.

Battlehip Bill Morris, the spry guard, led the Huskies to victory, aided by Husky sophomore Doug Ford, Morris, who usually sells 'em up for the boys, was in there shooting as well last night, collecting 14 points, stealing the ball, intercepting Beaver passes, and otherwise making a nuisance of himself.

At Moscow sophomore Norm Fredelkind bagged two field goals in the last three minutes to overcome an Oregon lead and give the Vandals enough for victory. His shots made it 37-34, and Don Kirsh of Oregon closed it up at 37-36 in the last minute.

Idaho added its final point on a free throw by high scoring center Ray Turner after a technical foul was called against Oregon's Coach Howard Hobson for protesting during a time-clock mixup that nearly turned the closing seconds into a free-for-all, with coaches and players arguing.

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Maple Squad Wins, 44 to 38; Play Tonight

It took quite a lot of checker playing on the part of Coach Howard Maple, but his Willamette university Beavers took the first of a two-game series from College of Idaho last night, 44 to 38. The second game, one which the Cats must win if they are to remain in the running for a spot in the Northwest championship, will get under way at 8 o'clock tonight.

Shorter on reserves than at any time this season, Maple had to resort to considerable strategy to pull the game out of the bag, although Sam Gallagher's 18 points were quite decisive in the final outcome.

There was little to choose between the two quins during most of the first. They got away to a slow start insofar as actual scoring was concerned and more than thirty minutes had elapsed before Jimmy Robertson finally cracked the ice with a gift shot. This was followed by a two pointer by Toolson and from there on until well into the second half the score was as tight as a drum head. The Cats held what margin there was much of the time although the Coyotes held one and two point leads on four occasions.

Half time found Willamette with a narrow 21 to 20, Robertson and Gallagher worked the margin up to a 27-22 basis after three minutes of play in the second half but Sherman, Williams and McClure wiped out the bulge and gave the visitors a momentary 31-31 lead. That was the high point in the Coyote offensive as Gallagher, Robertson and Lilly went on a 12 point scoring bee.

With a nine point lead, Willamette slowed the pace and did little firing. Dietrich and Williams, one handed push shot artists were particularly effective from the corners for Idaho and it was Dietrich's four baskets and three foul shots that kept the Coyotes in the ball game in the first half.

Sugar Robinson Rations One Lump

New York, Feb. 21 (AP)—They call him "Sugar," so Ray Robinson ratted one lump—on the head—to Maxie Berger of Montreal in the latter's welterweight fight at Madison Square Garden last night.

Like a pocket edition of Joe Louis, the skinny Harlem hammerer stopped Berger in one minute and 43 seconds of the second stanza of their scheduled 12-round, dropping him twice before referee Frankie Fullam ordered hostilities to cease.

For Robinson, who never has known defeat, it was the 28th consecutive triumph and the 22nd knockout since he turned professional less than two years ago after winning 80 fights as an amateur.

His performance earned him a shot at Red Cochrane's welterweight title, but there was talk that he might be matched with Marty Servo, the Schenectady coast guardsman, if a few legal problems between Robinson and a Philadelphia promoter can be untangled. He weighed 145 1/2 to Robinson's 144.

Gonzaga Beaten By Pilots, 39-30
