

Air Observers Are in Demand At Silverton

Silverton—An SOS call is being sent out for more volunteer observers at the airfield posts with at least 15 men and 15 women needed immediately to relieve those who are serving overtime.

Many of those on the job at present are doing long hours of labor for firms and in their own stores, making the Saturday night group, from 8 to 12 p. m., a scattering selection as local places of business remain open Saturday nights. This is the schedule that is up for voluntary bids.

The leaders are announcing that all are doing the work without pay. That work must be cut and hauled to the posts, that a certain amount of furniture is needed, as well as other necessities, such as fuel for lamps, is on the list, but above all, more observers are wanted.

The committee is extending thanks to the FFA boys for making the neat little cottage of one room at their school work house for placing at one of airfield posts. This small building was transported from the shop to the post by a truck loaned by Silver Falls mill which also donated the lumber, and when it made its way through the business streets last week caused no end of wondering comment.
