

Phosphorus Plant Not For The Dalles

Portland, April 21 (AP)—The Washington correspondent of the Oregonian reported today that a \$3,000,000 phosphorus plant, tentatively located at The Dalles, apparently would be built instead at Mobile, Ala.

The newspaper's dispatch said that war department favored The Dalles site, because it had an idle 35,000 kilowatt Bonneville power line and was relatively close to phosphate sources in Idaho and Montana.

But representatives from the south inserted in independent offices bill an appropriation for the plant to be built in the south. Then the senate passed the sixth deficiency bill and members of the Oregon delegation discovered, too late, that the appropriation had been lifted from the house-approved independent offices bill and inserted in the deficiency bill.

Parliamentarians now must decide whether the appropriation is legal, having passed the house in one bill and the senate in another.

Savings Bond Tax Proposed in Measure

Washington, April 21 (AP)—Legislation (R6952) to levy a "savings bond tax" of five percent annually on the "surtax net income" of individuals, but allowing as a credit savings bond purchases made during the taxable year, was introduced yesterday by Representative Coffee (D-Wash.)

Estates and trusts would be exempt from the tax, which was proposed as an amendment to the income tax law and would be applicable to taxable years beginning last December 31.

Other bills introduced included: Representative Anderson (D-NM)—Requiring that when the federal government takes over property for bombing or target ranges the owners be compensated at the market value (HR 6960).
