

### Justice Meted Three Inmates Polk Bastile

Dallas—Arrested by District Attorney Bruce Spaulding before Judge Arlie Walker Thursday were three Polk county jail inmates, Alfred Bradley Coling, William P. Campbell and Orvil Jones.

Coling, who was arrested in Marion county on a charge of forging a bank check for the sum of \$8.40, using the name of a West Salem resident, pled guilty and was returned to jail to await pre-sentence investigation of the State Parole board to whom his case was referred.

Campbell, arrested Monday by city police on a charge of breaking into the store of Glen Agee near the city park, upon pleading guilty, gave out the information that he had applied for enlistment in the U. S. armed forces and that negotiations were being made for his induction. He was given an order of dismissal on condition he was actually accepted and inducted into army service, and that he pay Glenn Agee the sum of \$2.25 for damages done his store.

Orvil Jones, who has been in jail about two weeks awaiting sentence on a non-support charge was released and placed on probation. He will have to pay to the clerk of the court \$15 on or before August 1942, and a like sum on or before the 10th of each month, and every month thereafter for support of his wife.
