Two Scrap Piles Rising at Lyons

Lyons—Lyons is behind the scrap metal drive with two dump places, one on the Cornforth lot, east of town, and the other on the lot between the Rebekah hall and the Everett Crabtree home. The one east of town is sponsored by the 4-H club members and the proceeds will be used at school. The other is sponsored by the Rebekah lodge, proceeds to go toward shingling the hall. The Weitman boys with the aid of their old rule, Sue, have been doing their bit. Everyone is asked to leave their scrap at one of these places which will be picked up at a later date.

Albany Collection Of Scrap Heavy

Albany—All day long the volume of iron and steel, copper, zinc, aluminum, lead, brass and miscellaneous other metals mounted to unexpected heights and before night it became certain that the complete collections of scrap would be impossible on Albany's day of concerted effort in gathering the scrap metal.

A steady stream of trucks poured metal into gondola freight cars at the scrap assembling centers.

No less than two-score of trucks, including two U. S. army trucks from Camp Adair, manned by soldiers, were on the job going at top speed all day long.

Local business establishments were operated entirely by women. Long lists of addresses informing where scrap heaps had been assembled were in the hands of the working committee. The incoming flood of scrap metals was dumped at the south end of Railroad street for segregation and loading, until the car spotted there had been filled. Then, before noon, trucks were directed to the Southern Pacific freight yard where a second car was also filled.

At noon Monday it was estimated that 100 tons, or 200,000 pounds had been loaded and many tons were still on the ground awaiting a third car.

In all four gondolas each containing between 80,00 and 100,000 pounds each of iron would not be too much to expect, it was announced, before loading out of Albany has been completed.

Farmers voluntarily brought scrap into town from a distance.

Participating almost in a body were high school students, who after winding up an interclass contest turned on the general drive and kept collecting metals.

No small share of credit for success of the local scrap drive was given by the salvage committee Monday to the pupils of the Albany school system.

Under general direction of City School Superintendent R. E. McCormick, a big pile of metal was assembled at each school. Every pupil was under orders from his teacher to bring with him a piece of scrap metal to school Monday and almost without exception the order was obeyed.

Hundreds of tiny tots in the lower grades laboriously trudged to their classes Monday, backs bending under weight of discarded andirons, flatirons, stove lids, and other articles too various for recording.

The high school participation gained color from a hastily arranged interclass contest between the junior and seniors for supremacy in scrap metal gathering.

A trophy will be given by the student body to the class gathering the most scrap. The contest closed at noon but not all of the scrap had been weighed at that time, so winners will not be known until Tuesday, it was announced.
