

Light Question Brings Problem To Silverton

Silverton—From reports flowing into civilian defense headquarters there appears to be dissatisfaction on both sides of the question, as concerns the compliance with federal light regulations.

S. Parzy Rose of the Portland General Electric office, has been named as "light consultant."

The headquarters at civilian defense say that rural folk are complaining because of requests to dim outdoor lights in the farm yards, saying they need the lights for doing their chores, that they are accustomed to this method of lighting and feel they must have it. The written civilian defense report continues:

"There is nothing that the local office can do about it other than check the lights and offer what advice they can. The orders to dim out comes from the army and local officials are of the opinion that they can and will be obeyed. If they are not obeyed voluntarily, they will be obeyed by force—as the army reports to headquarters that it isn't fooling about this order."

The civilian defense group advises that in many sections people have already paid heavy fines for failing to obey, and adds in capital letter warning—check your lights.

The headquarters office warns that time is from sunset to sundown and offers a calendar of time just when the sun sets and rises from November 13 through November 19, as per an ordinary almanac with the allowance made for the hour extra for the duration.

Albany Trunk Sewer Project Is Under Way

Albany—City Attorney Victor Oliver was ordered Wednesday by the city council to prepare the preliminary documents incidental to construction of a trunk sewer extending southward and westward from the intersection of Twelfth and Vine streets to Linnmont addition west of Elm street and south of Fifteenth.

This action was taken primarily for the purpose of facilitating the local residential construction project calling for erection of 66 new homes in the Linnmont tract, but it is designed incidentally to provide Rosemont addition also with more adequate sewer service than that now available.

Work on construction of this, Albany's largest single residential building project, started Wednesday with the pouring of concrete for three foundations. The construction company, Modern Homes, Inc., has a crew of 25 men already at work.

The council had before it two proposals for extensions connecting the newly developed tract with the city sewer system. The one involved extension of the Maple street sewer and the other a connection with the Twelfth street sewer.

The estimated cost of the Maple street plan is \$5,902.64 and that of the 12th street project, \$5,743.40.
