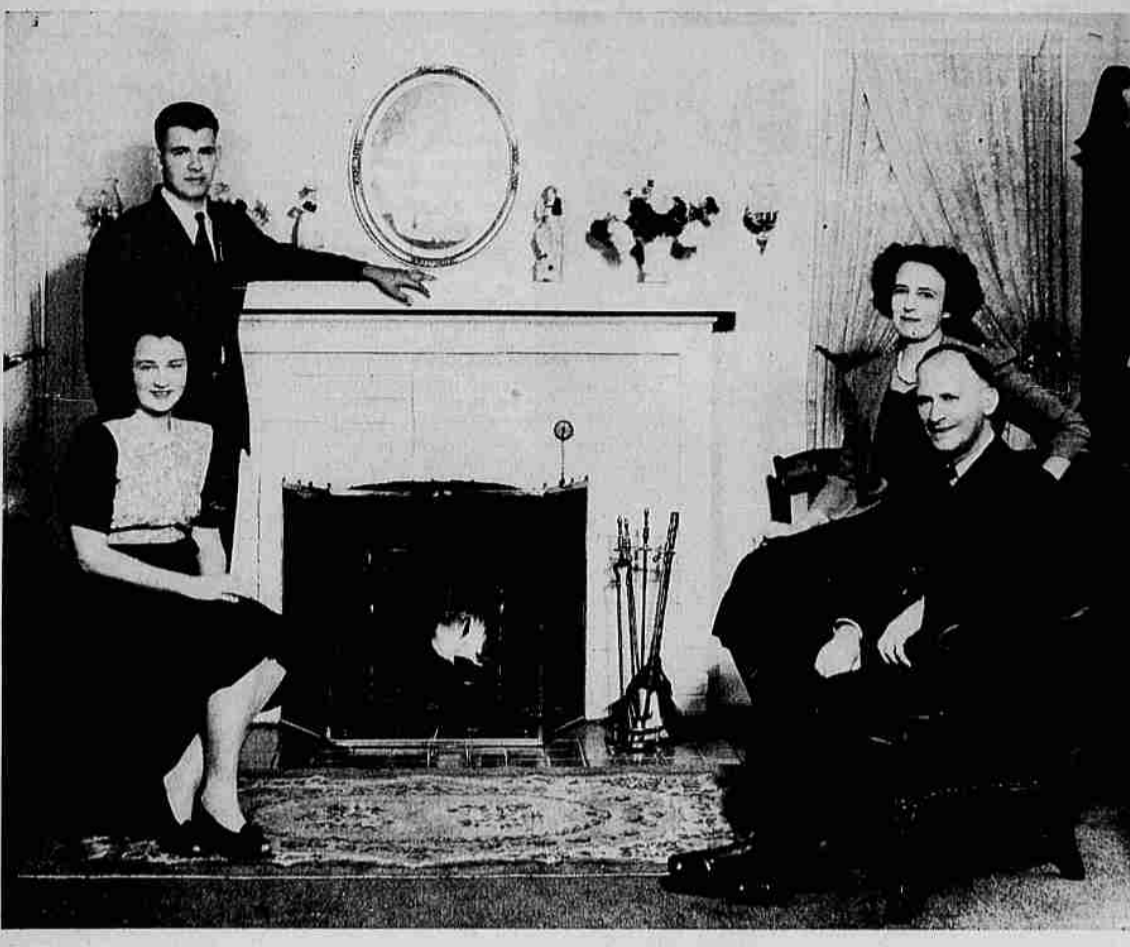


# Family Dinners and Small Informal Affairs will Celebrate Thanksgiving Season This Year

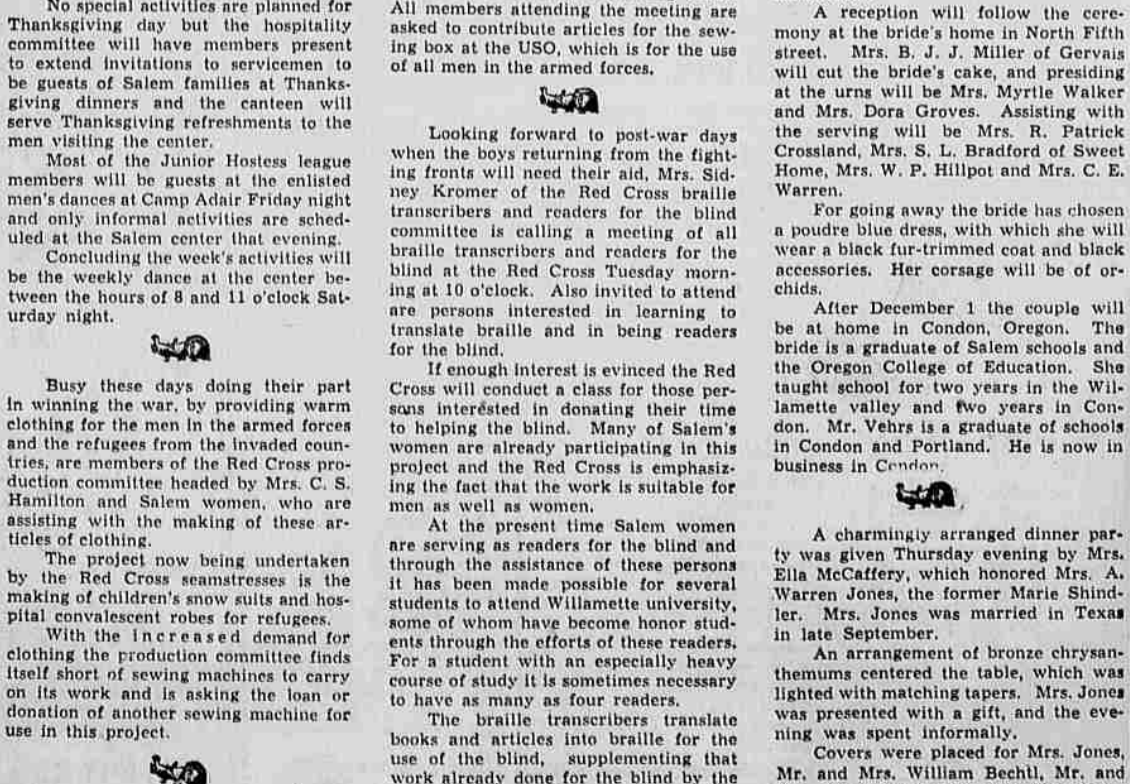
