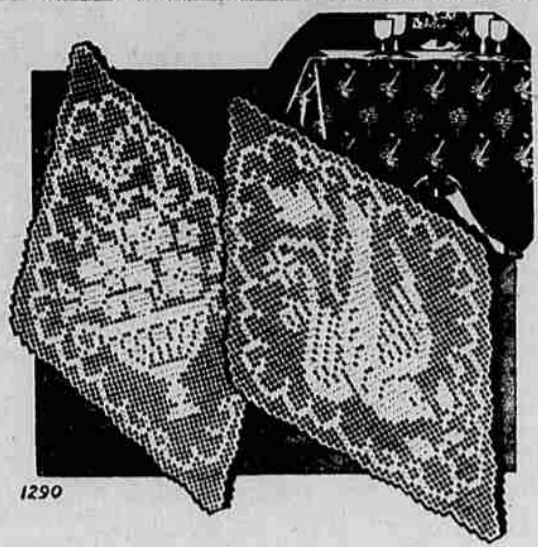
Irving's Will Celebrate Anniversary

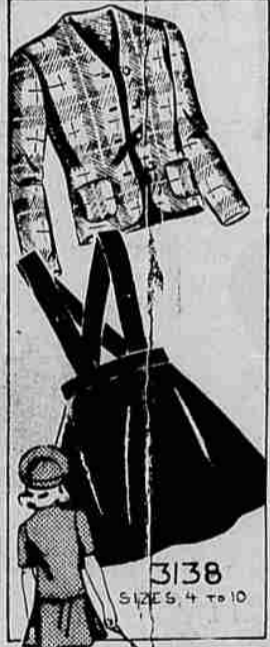
