West Salem, Jan. 28—Securing observers to serve at the Eola Hills observation post is becoming more difficult according to the captains who assume the responsibility of keeping civilians on 24-hour duty. Obtaining volunteers to maintain this schedule always presented a problem but since the beginning of gas rationing, persons who previously could be depended upon are now reluctant to use their automobiles for this purpose. Even the supplemental gasoline, which may be secured for this type of civilian defense work has done little to alleviate the situation, as persons who are ordinarily only entitled to A rationing cards are hesitant to throw themselves into the B classification for this reason exclusively.

Dallas—The Dallas library is serving as a collection point for a victory book campaign, designed to supply worthwhile books to the armed forces, that has opened here. According to announcement of Mrs. U. S. Loughary, librarian, books contributed here will be sent to Camp Adair.

Stress is being placed on quality rather than quantity of books. Many books collected in the 1942 campaign were unsuited to present reading needs of the army. There is a need for current and recent fiction and non-fiction (1930 to date), books on travel, biography, poetry, plays, hobbies, puzzles and games, as well as technical books of recent publication dealing with electricity, radio, machinery and meteorology. Books on trigonometry and calculus are needed, but not elementary texts.

Those donating books are asked to exclude works of authors popular 30 or 40 years ago. The camp is well supplied with copies of the works of Ralph Connor, Harold Bell Wright and others of that period.
