Independence 'Tar' Relates Experiences

Independence—Gordon L. Barnum, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Barnum, is in Independence enjoying a furlough from the U. S. navy. Barnum is a radio man and has just returned from a harrowing experience in northwest Africa. His ship, the Leedsdown, was sunk on the initial campaign in northwest Africa. The first torpedo from a torpedo plane was the night of November 8. The boat was crippled and had to lay to. The next day at about 12 o'clock they were attacked by high altitude planes and while this was taking place a submarine put two torpedoes into the ship.

They had to abandon ship then and 150 men were taken aboard an English corvette. The rest took to the beach and were held by the Arabs and the French. Barnum, with the other men, was then put aboard one of the U. S. ships and later transferred to a navy cargo ship due to the overcrowded complement. They were headed for England and later the states when, at 3:30 o'clock in the morning their boat was hit by a torpedo from a submarine.

They were taken off the ship by a Norwegian destroyer and taken to Gibraltar. After being there for four days and nights they were returned to the ship which had been towed back to Gibraltar. They lay there for about a week and then were taken to Casablanca by one of the U. S. war ships. Barnum was on shore duty there for a month and then returned to the United States landing in New York aboard an American cargo ship.

Barnum is due back in New York February 14. After his visit here he will spend a few days with his brother, Lee Barnum, yard manager of the Oregon pulp mill at Salem and then return to Portland to visit with Mrs. Barnum. He expects to return to Independence again before leaving for New York.

Barnum was guest speaker Monday night at the meeting of the Independence Lions club and told of his experiences. He also displayed a number of pieces of paper money and coins which he brought back with him. In addition to the members of the club many of the wives of members were present as well as other guests including Mrs. Barnum, Gordon's mother, and his brother, Lee, of Salem.

Gordon Barnum is a graduate of the Independence high school and is well known here. His brother, Don Barnum, was chief radio operator at Guam when it was captured and is now a Japanese prisoner.

Linn Clubbers Good Producers Report States

Albany—Linn county 4-H clubbers produced in goods and services the equivalent of \$25,128.79 last year at a cost of \$17,034.73 and with a margin of \$8,094.06 net profit, it was revealed in the annual report of O. E. Mikesell, county club agent, released Thursday.

The report stated that 902 individual boys and girls participated in the 1933 projects which yielded this sum. Accordingly the average gross income of club members was \$27.82.

It was pointed out that many members were engaged in projects such as health projects which do not bring in monetary returns.

Functioning in Linn county were 139 clubs having 102 adult local leaders, located in 78 school districts.

According to Mikesell, largest money making project was dairy with a profit of \$2,042.35. Closely following was the sheep project with \$1859.34. The third project was swine with \$1110.79.
