Dallas Youth Under Curfew

Dallas—In an effort to check juvenile delinquency locally, the Dallas council police committee, headed by J. R. Allgood, have instructed city police to start immediately to enforce the curfew ordinance to the letter. Under this ordinance, all children under 16 years of age must be off the streets after 10 p.m., unless accompanied by their parents or some older person. When a child breaks the curfew law a second time, his parents are liable to a \$20 fine or a 10-day jail sentence. Habitual offenders may be turned over to the juvenile court for placing in a home.

The problem of "teen-age youngsters ignoring the curfew law was brought out at the last meeting of the city council, when Mayor Frank E. Kersey, leading a discussion on local delinquency, asked council members to consider the advisability of having a police matron on call. Parents, it was reported, have not been backing up local officials in curfew enforcement. The police committee, to whom the matter was referred, decided to enforce all provisions of the ordinance in order to cope with parental indifference.
