Favors Stiff Fines for Parents

The parent who is fined \$25 for the delinquency of his children will soon bring home to him the responsibilities of family life, Justice Arthur D. Hay of the Oregon supreme court asserted as he closed his address before the Salem Lions club Thursday noon. Speaking on education, the judge declared that child delinquency has its roots in the home and that the parent is responsible. He advocated a stiff fine for the parents "because that is the only language some of them understand."

Justice Hay said too much emphasis has been placed on formal education, with many parents sending their children to college and university because they thought it was the thing to do. As a result, he added, we have an overabundance of "white collar men" and not enough mechanics. "Degrees after a name do not always mean that the person involved has anything in the head," he asserted. He said that he "doubted if one per cent of us are capable of original thinking."

Too prolonged process of education becomes a vice, Justice Hay said, causing the one involved to become exaggerated over his importance in the scheme of things. "Many college men teach because they do not know what to do. The man who can demonstrate what he is saying is the man who is the most successful teacher."

125 Tons of Bombs Fall on Burma Japs

New Delhi, May 21 (AP)—U.S. bombers of the 10th air force set a new record for the second successive day Wednesday when they dropped more than 125 tons of explosives on Japanese communications and installations in Burma, a communique said today.

Fifty tons of the bombs landed on targets at Magwe, on the Irrawaddy river, setting fires visible 80 miles. Two flights of bombers made the attack and the second group of fliers saw smoke rising two miles in the air.

The other raids were against the Padakkun oil fields near Magwe, Thayetmyo and nearby Payay on the Irrawaddy, Lanwa and Singu, near Chauk. Not a plane was lost.

Lewis Going To Washington

New York, May 21 (AP)—United Mine Workers officials announced today that UMW president John L. Lewis would go to Washington during the day and that headquarters of the union in New York would be closed immediately.

There was no immediate explanation of the move nor was there any indication that Lewis' trip to Washington meant that he might have agreed to consult with the war labor board which he has ignored since the soft coal wage dispute was referred to it several weeks ago.

UMW officials also said that UMW Vice-President John O'Leary was leaving for Pittsburgh, but did not elaborate. Thomas Kennedy, UMW secretary-treasurer, will remain in New York along with the union's anthracite negotiating committee which is currently engaged in collective bargaining talks with the hard coal operators.

Merriam Talks On Geology

It was 44 years ago this month that Dr. John C. Merriam, noted geologist and paleontologist, then attached to the staff of the University of California, made his first visit to Oregon. Speaking to a group of persons in Waller hall on the Willamette university campus, Dr. Merriam admitted that oddly enough, his first visit to Oregon was for the purpose of finding certain specimens of bones from the fossil beds of central Oregon to take back to California. During his present stay in Oregon, with headquarters at Eugene, he is continuing his interest in the John Day valley. He announced the formation of "John Day Associates," an organization which, he hopes will carry on the work of developing and preserving the fossil beds.

In the interest of the project it is probable a small booklet will be issued, carrying a description of the spots involved and which should be of assistance to those who visit the districts. The title is to be "The Earth Shall Teach Thee."

During his talk Dr. Merriam urged a better interpretation of the aspects of nature that "we have before us." Such an interpretation is bound to make better citizens of those who will participate, he asserted.

The speaker was brought here by the Salem Geological society which holds monthly meetings on the Willamette campus.

Navy Classes To Open in July

Willamette university does not expect any additions to the 258 men who have been assigned to the local campus by the navy department in connection with the V-12 program, Dr. George Herbert Smith, president, stated upon his return from New York where he participated in a conference of representatives from educational institutions involved. The university has asked for no additions to the list since there is no desire to crowd the facilities.

Dr. Smith learned during the conference that the navy department desires to have their men take part in the regular university program as much as possible with a minimum of emphasis placed on the military aspect of their life. However, the 258 will not come under the regulation which calls for student body fees from the regular students. Officers who will be in charge of the program here, who are now attending Columbia university, will probably reach Salem early in July and classes are expected to get underway shortly thereafter.

Yamamoto Regarded Ablest Naval Strategist of Japan

The following close-up of the late Admiral Isoroku Yamamoto was written by the manager of the former United Press bureau in Tokyo who was interned by the Japanese at the start of the war. He returned to the United States in the exchange of diplomats and newspapermen.

New York, May 21 (AP)—Admiral Isoroku Yamamoto was probably the greatest military and naval strategist Japan ever had, and his death is a blow to Japan comparable to what the loss of Gen. Douglas MacArthur would be to the United States. Outside of Premier Tojo, Yamamoto was the best known and most popular of Japan's war leaders. He was a poker player, a heavy drinker, and a hard-hitting fighting man, a man who would go personally into air combat anytime.

There is no question but what he got close to Pearl Harbor during the sneak attack of Dec. 7. How close no one here knows for sure, but the report he sent back is known. It was couched in poker lingo and it read: "American held a full house but we had a royal flush."
